Dear friends,

This week a friend suggested meeting up at the Leslie Science & Nature Center (discoverscienceandnature.org). What a treasure, and just five minutes from St. Andrew's! We were there to see the raptors. These amazing, beautiful birds have suffered permanent injuries that make them unable to survive in the wild. They are cared for in enclosures and serve as 'avian ambassadors,' trained to help educate people about their natural history and the challenges facing raptors today. You can visit these walk-up enclosures during daylight hours, a short, reasonable uphill walk from the parking lot. We saw a juvenile and an adult Red-tailed Hawk, a Bald Eagle, two Turkey Vultures, and a Great Horned Owl.

We were especially fortunate to spend about an hour talking with David Clipner, the Director of Education and Wildlife at the Leslie and the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum. He has an amazing wealth of information about animal behavior and the ways these 'wild' birds interact with humans. We wanted to get his take on 'imprinting,' the theory that an animal in captivity may identify with an individual human as their closest kin or species. So, for instance, my cat, who has had very little experience of other cats for many years, may think of himself as 'human' and me as his older brother or parent.

Clipner has some healthy skepticism about this theory. He said that in some rare cases when a bird ends up at a place like the Leslie at a very young age, before they've really learned how to be an owl or an eagle or a vulture from their parents, they may learn how to be an owl or an eagle or a vulture from their human handlers. He's skeptical, however, of anthropomorphizing their behaviors much further, ascribing human emotions like love and affection to creatures with wholly different concerns than our own.

As I say, the raptors are awesome, and seeing their behavior through Clipner's eyes was fascinating, all of it a testament to the gift of creation and the miracle of human intelligence. And as we begin the season of Advent, it got me thinking about what this time of preparation and anticipation really is about. We're getting ready to celebrate the incarnation of God in the person of Jesus, God entering creation *on our terms*, in a way fully accessible to all of our God-given senses and experiences. In Jesus, we see as clearly as we can what God is like, what it means to be fully human, and how to live as a child of God. The Incarnation is an invitation to 'imprint' ourselves more completely in God, an invitation to learn how to be the people God is calling us to be.

Holding you all in gratitude and prayer during this busy season of preparation and anticipation.

Rice for Widows and Children

Dear St. Andrew's,

Greetings! Again I thank God for his continued healing hands on me. Slowly, I am getting better although I cannot yet write or do minor things. I thank my family of St. Andrew's and St. Aidan's for your continued prayers for my recovery. Thank you very much and may God provide for you in your time of need.

It is Christmas now. Every year before my ill health, I had conducted Christmas SERV/V/Sales of my African artifacts that sustained my mini-project of providing rice and beans to the widows, orphans, and some poor elderly of my village during Christmas. And every year, you have patronized me and chipped in to help the project. Over the years, I have seen the number of widows in this group increase geometrically. Most of them are young widows with little children of elementary age. With your help, I have sustained this effort each year.

This year, my inquiry informed me that the bags of beans and rice I bought last year have tripled in price but that does not stop the hungry mouths from yearning for food. You have been the reason these poor and indigent women and orphans have food on their tables at Christmas.

Thank you for supporting this project by chipping in. I no longer conduct the sales because of my ill health but the yearning for food at Christmas continues! Once more, can you please help to put "food" on their tables this Christmas? Please make a check out to St. Andrew's with "Rice and beans" in the memo line and send to church by Sunday, December 17th. God willing, I will send them the collected message for Christmas on Tuesday, 19th of December. May God bless you!

A Lasting Legacy



2021 Renovations a Gift from Constance "Connie" Rinehart (1922-2023)

In 2021, St. Andrew's was blessed to receive a large, unrestricted gift from a very generous benefactor who wished to remain anonymous. The conditions of this gift were that it be used for capital improvements to the building and that their identity remain anonymous until their passing.

While we were saddened by Connie's passing in August, we are grateful to finally be able to publicly acknowledge her

unceasing generosity to the church at a time when it was dearly needed. Connie's gift enabled us to make a number of improvements to Parish Hall wing of the building while the church was closed to in-person worship from March 2020 - August 2021 due to the pandemic. Prior to these upgrades, most of Parish Hall had not had any work done in 20+ years, and some areas had not been improved since it was originally built in 1948-49.

A brass plaque recognizing Connie's gift has been hung on the stairwell to the second floor of the Parish Hall.

A published author and poet, Connie was a professor and assistant dean at the (then) School of Library Science at UofM from 1967-88. A long-time parishioner, Connie was also active in the church's finance office as one of the Monday morning Counters. In lieu of flowers, she asked friends to remember the Memorial Fund at St. Andrew's, or to plant seeds for pollinators in whatever plot of ground they may be able to access.

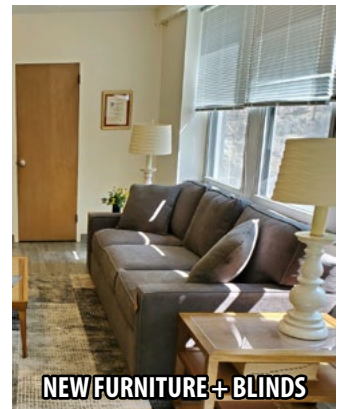
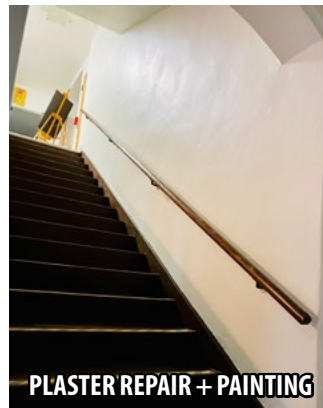

Director's Chair

It was very sad to learn of the passing of Nancy Heusel in November. Nancy was the long-time Director of Christian Education who created a wonderful theater ministry involving people of all ages. Her earliest plays were in the 1970's. Of course, there were Christmas pageants with all the usual characters, from tiny angels to Wise Men with Ph.D.'s. There were plays for mostly adult actors, such as *Murder in the Cathedral* and *A Man for All Seasons*. There were short plays taking the role of the sermon, such as *Our Scottish ConneXion* and *The Selfish Giant*. And beginning in 1993, every spring there was a Supper Theater experience, with supper served by the youth as a fundraiser, followed by a full-length play. All the spring plays after the first—*Charlotte's Web*—were musicals. It would be hard to estimate the total number of people involved in at least one of these theatrical experiences.

Nancy was a tower of faith, optimism, energy, and enthusiasm. If you weren't careful, you were going to end up in a dramatic presentation, as I did. I learned from Nancy the power and importance of story-telling, both to story tellers and story listeners. It is central to our faith. It was fitting that on her retirement, the theater in the Parish Hall was named for her. Before the performance of *Narnia* this past May, the new lighting system, made possible by a donation from Connie Rinehart, was dedicated and blessed by Fr. Wayne Rollins. The new dimensions the lighting has added to plays, beginning with *Narnia*, is a wonderful tribute to what Nancy created.

Our Scottish ConneXion, which was staged during the 10:00 am service on November 26, the Sunday in which we recognized St. Andrew, was created by Nancy, Svea Gray, and others. As one line in the play says, "this year marks the 196th anniversary of our beloved St. Andrew's." We are getting close to our bicentennial, and I am hoping that theater can play a role in the celebrations in 2027.

From *ConneXion* we segue right into the Christmas pageant. This year we are putting on a musical pageant that hasn't been done for a while at St. Andrew's, *'Twas the Year Before Christmas*. Rehearsals are underway with the children's choirs are already working on the music, but there are plenty of speaking roles for all ages!

Breakfast Updates

There have been some exciting developments in the Breakfast Program this fall. The Washtenaw County Health Department issued an upgraded health license for our commercial kitchen in October. This new license allows us to expand our menu. We have started serving sausage, breakfast sandwiches, pancakes with fresh blueberries, French toast, and deli meats and cheese for sandwiches to go. Future plans include scrambled eggs, breakfast casseroles and breakfast burritos. We are even considering adding a homemade soup and chili station in the winter. It may not be traditional breakfast food, but it will be warm and comforting (and full of protein and fresh vegetables).

I have worked at the Breakfast almost every morning since starting as the Director on September 1, and I have enjoyed getting to know our guests. Many are regulars who have come every day for years, but we are seeing more and more new faces lately. One of my favorite tasks in the morning is to unlock the front door and greet each person by name as they walk inside. Guests often share their stories or talk about their challenges with me and the other volunteers as we walk around the dining room. Our many dedicated volunteers and I have been working together to create a peaceful and safe space for our guests to enjoy breakfast. And I believe we are making good progress. One of our regular guests recently told me, "You make us feel normal down here. It feels like a home."

Last week, one of our regular guests brought me a note he had written to express his gratitude for the Breakfast Program. His name is Michael. He is almost 70 years old, and he has been coming to eat with us almost every day since he came to town in February. I asked Michael if I could share his note in *The Network*, and he said he was honored to be able to tell others how the Breakfast Program helps him and so many others.

We have been working with other organizations in the community to fill our dining room donation rack with warm clothing as the weather gets colder. The Kiwanis Thrift Store has graciously offered to regularly donate shoes, boots, warm clothes, backpacks, and small rolling suitcases. The Ann Arbor Thrift Shop will be dropping off some donations before Thanksgiving, and we are looking forward to distributing hats, gloves and warm socks to our guests in December, thanks to the generous donations from members of the parish.

Some of you may have seen the plaque in the dining room honoring Breakfast volunteers who have passed away. Phil MacBride has volunteered to update that plaque for us. If anyone is aware of other volunteers whose names should be on it, please let me know.

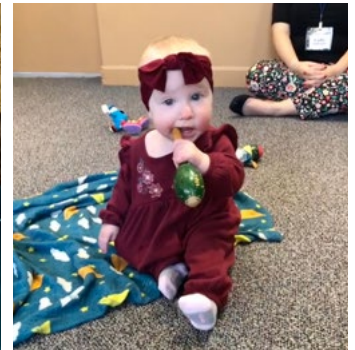

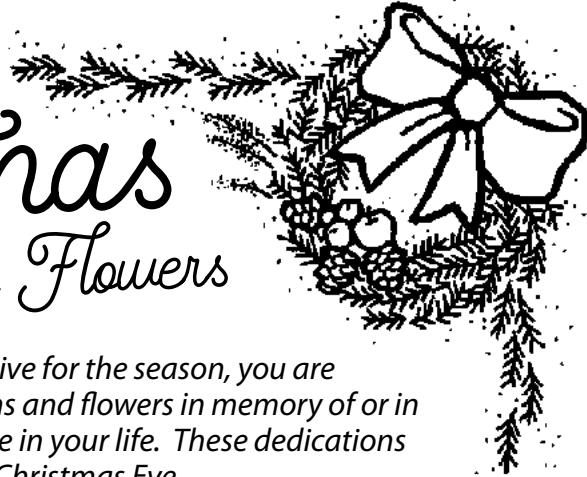
