As this reaches you, I will have spent six months in Ann Arbor as your Interim Rector. The search process continues at full speed, and we have much to accomplish before a new Rector arrives. Here are some of the things I see, both as an Interim, and as things I would hope have been addressed if I were to move to a new position as a called Rector.

We remain in a nebulous part of a global pandemic. Winter months always see a rise in respiratory illnesses, and the precautions taken during Covid-19 meant that we lost some immunity to some of those other illnesses. We're not completely out of the woods yet, but can see the horizon through the trees. We will need to continue conversations around how best to address this issue.

With that in mind, it's time to restart some programs that were put on hold. One of those was lay pastoral visitors. These visitors can also be trained and licensed as Lay Eucharistic Visitors, who take Communion to homebound parishioners. This ministry will become more important as we move forward, as the need for it in a parish the size of St. Andrew's far surpasses the ability of one or even two clergy can meet.

That brings me to an over-arching entity in the room. Pledges for 2023 have fallen much below expectations, requiring a withdrawal of nearly 25% of reserve funds to meet current

levels of spending. Historically, some pledges come in after the new year, but uncertainty about the economy, deaths or moving away of some long-time parishioners, and other events have contributed to the decline in pledging.

We have three positions that are open or coming open soon. The first to open was the Director of Christian Education, which is being filled on an interim part-time basis. That will continue for the time being, as how that position may be filled is something a new Rector will want to help decide. The other two, Parish Administrator and Finance Administrator, are receiving applications.

This means that parishioners will be needed to help with some aspects of those positions. We already have volunteers who come into the office four days each week. We may need more to help. And, there may be some aspects of administration that will need to be set aside until they can be met. One of the ways we do this will be reactivating the Building and Grounds Committee, who will oversee projects and the work of building maintenance along with our Sexton, Matt Marsh.

I have been in touch with some experienced folks regarding different ways to do stewardship. Several of the ways mentioned have been used at St. Andrew's, with the default position being a fall drive much like


we saw in 2022. Some of those with whom I spoke said that a parish like St. Andrew's should have some creative members who can develop a program, either from scratch or based on something that already exists. The Episcopal Network for Stewardship (TENS) has a well-developed program that uses a yearlong approach that begins in Advent. That could provide a starting point for discussion and implementation, but it needs to begin before Summer arrives.


I like the idea that St. Andrew's has the creative energy to develop an answer to not just stewardship, but every other issue I've mentioned. The CAT survey presented in October expresses a desire for collaboration, and working together to create processes and programs to meet the needs of the parish will help us do that.

It's time to begin discussing all these and other topics. I invite your input.



The Primary Class will be talking about being a good neighbor, welcoming everyone, the Eucharist, and the Book of Common Prayer before Passover/Last Supper and Jesus' arrest leading us to Easter, April 9. The Intermediate Class will also continue the parables followed by a study of the Book of Common Prayer, the liturgy of Sunday mornings and the Eucharist.

Rite 13 uses the Rite 13 curriculum while addressing the current concerns of the students and having some fun along the way. J2A continues to build community working together to raise money for their Pilgrimage (making Anglican prayer beads which will soon be for sale) and to plan their Pilgrimage. Each week they study the gospel, using the J2A curriculum as appropriate for their questions and interests.

We thank all the adults who are supporting the Church School, especially those helping in the classrooms. We couldn't do it without you! And thanks to parents for bringing your children. We are still rebuilding our attendance "post" Covid and appreciate your diligence.
