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Dear Friends:

In the Sunday gospel readings weeks just prior to Lent and throughout Lent itself, we see Jesus calling the first disciples, performing acts of healing and restoration, teaching about the kingdom of God and offering himself as a manifestation of it. In one sense, Jesus is displaying a model for leadership to pass on to what would become the Church. It is, of course, an unusual but perfect model which is impossible for us to duplicate. But in no way should that deter us, the Church, from trying to pattern our common life and ministry on that of our leader and savior. Trying to follow Christ's model of leadership is never a wasted effort.

We are now in the midst of our periodic process of choosing a leader for our nation. It is a difficult process and one on which can be heaped a great deal of criticism. On a similar front, if you are like me you hold the attitude that I can criticize my family as much as I want, but God help you if you utter one word against them in my hearing. The same goes for our country. I recently found myself getting agitated while watching a foreign news commentary of our election process. The journalist, from another western democracy, was highly critical of how we go about choosing a president, and blamed both major political parties for the mess. While I agreed with the basic opinion the whole thing seemed a bit disingenuous to me. What stopped me from indignantly changing channels was his final comment: "It's hard to accept the United States as the leader of the Free World when it chooses its own leader in such an undignified manner." That brought everything into focus for me: What does it mean to be a leader? And along with that question goes another. What does it mean to put your trust in someone?

We have shown that as a nation we have a hard time with trust. That may be due, in part, to those who have blatantly violated our trust. But I would like to think that the

number of crooks in positions of authority is actually few. Yet we still find it difficult to trust. That is never more clear than when we are told things we don't want to hear. Respectfully allowing for differences of opinion is a thing of the past. The loss of that sense of respect has turned our politics and many other systems and institutions in this country toxic. We are a poorer nation for it.

This is where I think the Church has something to say. One of Jesus' greatest strengths as a leader is that his message was straightforward and unambiguous – to draw anyone who sought it into a relationship with God. Along with that is Jesus' consistent reference to himself and the relationship God seeks to have with us through him. On the rare occasions that criticism passed his lips it was not uttered in an effort to condemn his listeners but to draw his listeners back to God. If people got angry with him when he said things they did not like, he still loved them. If his actions in the name of justice rubbed some people the wrong way, he was still merciful. If he was unjustly slandered, he forgave. And when he was killed and rose from the grave, he did not seek revenge but offered salvation.

Yes, that is an impossible model of leadership to duplicate. Maybe it's too much to ask any politician to even try. But it is a model that countless people over the centuries have trusted in, and one that I, and I imagine you would be eager to follow if someone would just step forward and lead. And someone has, who has empowered us, his Church to be his body in the world. If we seek a better world, a better nation, a better Church then it is up to us to live into the model we have been given and lead from our own hearts and minds and hands as Christ has shown us how.

Book Discussion Group

The Book Discussion Group will meet on Sunday, March 25, at 11:30 am in the chapel. Please feel free to bring a brown-bag lunch. Given that 2011 was a year of revolutions and the Occupy Movement is still a presence, the Outreach Ministry will be sponsoring *Blessed Unrest* by Paul Hawken. Published in 2007 this book seems to have predicted current events. Paul Hawken has spent more than a decade researching organizations dedicated to restoring the environment and fostering social justice. From billion-dollar non-profits to single-person dot.causes, these groups collectively comprise the largest movement on earth, a movement that has no name, leader, or location and that has gone largely ignored by politicians and the media. *Blessed Unrest* explores the diversity of the movement, its brilliant ideas, innovative strategies, and centuries of hidden history. A culmination of Hawken's many years of leadership in the environmental and social justice fields, it will inspire all who despair of the world's fate, and its conclusions will surprise even those within the movement itself. Young Ones Valentine Party

The younger children (including the 9:15 am folks, the Morning Glories class, the kindergarten/first grade class and their families) are cordially invited to a Saturday morning Valentine Party. This tradition began several years ago so that the families who regularly attend the 9:15 am Eucharist service would have an opportunity to interact with the families who attend Church School.

On February 11 we will gather in the first floor Morning Glories room from 10:00 am – 11:30 am. We'll have refreshments, decorate cookies, play games and enjoy crafts while the parents socialize!

Carnivale

Sunday, February 19

This is the day of our Church School's Pre-Lenten 'Carnivale'. It takes place at the end of Epiphany, just before Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. The Church School welcomes everyone to this celebration, Sunday, February 19, from 11:30 am – 1:00 pm in the Parish Hall. Each class will sponsor an activity: games, a cake walk, fish pond (fishing for little gifts) making of masks and our very popular face painting with Miss Val.

There will be prizes as well as colorful beads for all. Lunch will be prepared by the J2A group. Most events are free, but there is a small cost for the cake walk (Rite 13) and the lunch (J2A). Proceeds from these events are used for future Pilgrimages.

Ash Wednesday Family Service

Wednesday, February 22 at 4:30 pm

Each year we have a special service for the children on Ash Wednesday, a day that marks the beginning of Lent. The Junior Choir will sing, and the Church School members will be the readers for this service. The "Alleluia Scroll" will be created during the preceding Sunday at Carnivale, and will be buried in the undercroft of the church by the children attending the Ash Wednesday service. The word "alleluia" is not spoken or sung during Lent. On Easter Sunday the scroll will be resurrected and placed in the church.

Treasure Boxes for Joveline Devil

Each Lenten season the children are given little boxes in which to place coins. This offering is to be saved through doing good deeds, and helping around the home. On Easter Sunday the boxes are to be placed in the white cross outside the Chapel. The contribution is for our new foster child, Joveline Devil.

Joveline was introduced to you on January 22 when Rite 13 sponsored a Foster Child Bake Sale in her honor. Joveline is 13 years old and lives in Trou-du-Nord, Haiti. The area in the northern part of Haiti has

no access to public electricity and no running water. It must be dug from a hole in the ground. Trou is French for "hole." Our adoption agency, PLAN, has sent us information about Joveline and the area in which she lives. It is posted on our Church School bulletin board located in the room next to the lobby.

Our dear Foster Child Nickenson Confident has graduated from our program. He and his family are together again, and living with other relatives in Haiti. We have supported Nickenson since he was three years old, and now has become a young man of 19. We pray that he may have an abundant life as a child of God.

Experiencing Holy Week

A Lenten Message for Families

A wise old owl sat in an oak.

My spiritual director once gave me the following assignment to help me become more comfortable with listening in the silence. I was asked to spend ten minutes or so just sitting and breathing and praying the following mantra: "Lord, let me feel your presence." The strangest thing happened every time I would do this. No matter what time of day I picked to spend these few moments, my daughter, who was then three, would appear and sit with me. It didn't matter if she had been still in bed or engaged in PBS Kids or playing, whenever I prayed, "Lord let me feel your presence." Tessa would come.

Needless to say, the significance of such a "coincidence" was not wasted on me. It still gives me goose bumps! Getting closer to God and getting closer to the ones we love are not necessarily different things. Here are just a few ways you can accomplish both as a family.

- Eat at least one meal a day together. One evening during dinner my son Josh said, "I think when Jesus told us to remember him when we eat bread he meant every time we eat bread and not just at Communion." I believe he is right. Our meals are an extension of the Body of Christ. Break bread together and record the wealth of wisdom in your family.

- At least once during Lent, take a technology Sabbath and power down. We pick a weekend and go without electric lights and all screens from Friday sundown to Saturday sundown. My kids will tell you that playing flashlight tag and hide and go seek in the dark is the highlight of their Lent. Now even the neighborhood kids look forward to it.

- Make a collage of pictures of people you want to pray for during Lent and post it on your fridge. Every time you pass by, look at the pictures and remember to pray for those persons. It can also be removed from the fridge and used as a bedtime ritual.

- And finally, make a point to be involved in all of the wonderful opportunities St. Andrew's has to offer in the Church School and beyond.

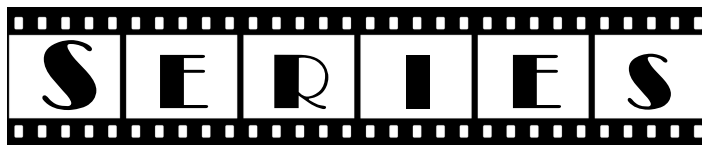
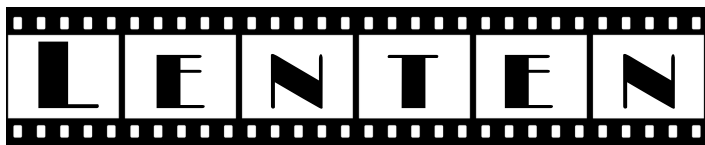
