Dear Friends:

We, along with Christians throughout the world have just celebrated the feast of Our Lord's resurrection by which he "destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light," as our Prayer Book says. Yet on the same day of this joyous celebration over 70 people were killed by a bomb blast in a park in Pakistan, and the previous week over 30 people perished in terrorist attacks in Brussels. These are just the latest in a series of tragedies spawned by a hatred that has nothing to do with light or life. And while it has not yet risen to the level of bomb throwing, the discourse surrounding the presidential campaign in this country (or at least what is generally reported) is dominated with speech that is hate-filled and violence-inciting. (One can only imagine how low the debate around state and local elections will get.) In all of these situations theories abound as to the source of this hatred and the reactions it creates. Finding answers, to this horrifying situation our world is in, is not easy and I won't pretend to have any.

One thing each of us can do is to examine the hatred that lives in each of us, because as much as we might like to deny it or ignore it hate is there on some level. The ancient editors who compiled the collection of Psalms in the Bible knew this to be true. A great deal of the language in those poems deals with the authors' hatred of various enemies, real and perceived. It seems clear that this language made it into Holy Scripture so that we would have a way of dealing with the reality of hatred within ourselves, lest it consume us. That way is prayer, which is what the Psalms are.

In an essay on the "Angry" Psalms\*, Eugene Peterson says:

*"It is easy to be honest before God with our hallelujahs; it is somewhat more difficult to be honest in our hurts; it is nearly impossible to be honest before God in the dark emotions of our hate. So we commonly suppress our negative emotions... But when we pray the psalms, these classic prayers of God's people, we find that will not do. We must pray who we actually are, not who we think we should be. In prayer, all is not sweetness and light. The way of prayer is not to cover our unlovely emotions so that they will appear respectable, but expose them so that they can be enlisted in the work of the kingdom. [As Walter Brueggemann writes,] 'It is an act of profound faith to entrust one's most precious hatreds to God, knowing they will be taken seriously.' Hate, prayed, takes our lives to bedrock where the foundations of justice are being laid."* — Answering God, pp. 100-101

Peterson goes on to acknowledge that in spite of all our hopes that it might be different, enemies are a fact of life. He also points out that the uncomfortable commandment Jesus has given us is to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us (Matthew 5:44). While that may not do much, if anything, to change the hearts and behavior of those whose lives are filled with hatred, love and prayer can change us. There is little that we can control in our world, but one thing over which we have total control is how we regard and engage the world in which we live. If we want something different than what we have then we have to start somewhere. A true examination of our own hearts is a good place to begin.

# HISTORY

### The Venerable Bede Window

The Venerable Bede window was installed in 1940 in memory of Arthur Lyon Cross (1873-1940), Professor of History at the University, a member of the Vestry and the author of "History of St. Andrew's Church," published in 1906. The seal of the Diocese of Maine in the lower right corner of the window refers to his birthplace, Portland, Maine.

The Venerable Bede (673-735) is in the center with an ink-pot and quill pen hanging from his belt. His shield is below his figure, the shield of Ireland to the left and the shield of England on the right. Bede is best known for *The Ecclesiastical History of England*, covering 397-731 when Anglo-Saxon culture developed and Christianity triumphed. The four figures along the margins are St. Ambrose (339-397) on the left above, Bishop of Milan, and St. Augustine (d. 413) on the right, sent by Pope Gregory I to England and the first Archbishop of Canterbury. Below on the left is St. Benedict Biscop (628-690), who was Bede's teacher, on the right is St. Jerome (ca347-420), translator of the Bible from Greek and Hebrew into Latin Vulgate.


In the upper panel Bede is dictating a translation of the Gospel of John into the vernacular. In the lower panel are the figures of St. Cuthbert (625-687) on the left and King Alfred I of England (849-899) on the right. St. Cuthbert's biography was written by Bede, while King Alfred I translated theological works from Latin, Greek and Hebrew into English.

In the lower panel is a view of Durham Cathedral, the site of Bede's tomb, and the words "*Haec sunt in fossa, Bedae Venerabilis ossa*" (In this tomb are the bones of Venerable Bede).

The window was created by the Willet Studio of Philadelphia.

# CHURCH SCHOOL HAPPENINGS

## **In the Classroom**

The children in Morning Glories preschool through early elementary recently shared stories of Jesus' Baptism, his time in the wilderness, the events of Lent, Holy Week and will continue with the Easter Story leading to the gift of the Holy Spirit and Jesus' teachings to the world in the parables of the Good Samaritan and Great Banquet. Elementary grades explored the sacraments along with lectionary based lessons for the early spring term culminating with a very special Instructed Eucharist to be led by Fr. Alan on April 24. All of these classes made thoughtful Valentine cards with TLC for our homebound parishioners. They also enjoyed a meaningful Chapel Gathering of music and movement that included a march for Martin Luther King Jr. and a closing song from LEVAS II: "I've got peace like a river, I've got joy like a fountain, I've got love like an ocean." AMEN!

The Church School's Seder Feast saw a record number of participants (80!) share the events of the Exodus story, Passover and reflect on the remembrance of Christ's last supper. Even our youngest Morning Glories enjoyed making grape juice dots on their plates (one for each of the ten plagues) and cracking open hard boiled eggs symbolizing new life.

Many of the children and youth also had roles as Moses, Pharaoh, the Children, and Israelites in the dramatic retelling of the ancient stories. We recalled the suffering of the Israelites, but also celebrated their won freedom and the fulfillment of God's promise.

Thank you to Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra and Jeanine Diller for their leadership, and to the entire teaching team for their support in bringing this event to life.

## Rite 13 Celebration

During the 10:00 am service on Sunday, May 1, we will recognize and honor an important rite of passage with our 7th and 8th graders. The Rite 13 Celebration is a special liturgy shared with the entire congregation and is a rite of passage that recognizes the gift that God bestows upon each one of us: the gift of manhood and womanhood. This is a free gift that we cannot earn and need not prove. This gift is the essence of who we are. As our young people grow and mature their knowledge and skills will increase, but the core of who they are remains the same.

One of the unique aspects of the Journey to Adulthood program is that it provides rites of passage that are often lacking in our culture. We help define points along the path to adulthood that tell our young people they are making progress; they are growing; they are becoming adults. Rite-13 is the liturgical cornerstone that lays the foundation for the entire congregation of St. Andrew's to rise up and in one mighty voice tell our young people, "You matter to us. Your lives are of inestimable value. The journey you are now embarking on is significant." It is a way that we fulfill our baptismal covenant of "seeking and serving Christ in all persons."

We hope the entire parish will join us for this very special rite of passage. It is a priceless opportunity for parents, leaders and the congregation to affirm "all that is good in our young people" who live and grow around us and to recognize them as rising young men and women in our midst.

## Youth Guest Presenters

Lessons on Homemade Pizza, Drumming and African-American Spirituals

The youth groups had a very special opportunity to connect with a few of our parishioners outside the classroom format in late winter.

February's Leap of Faith Party provided occasion to discover the music, rhythm and spiritual powers of drumming from George Watson. He shared with us the origins and basic drumming techniques on the djembe, bonga and conga drums and many other shaker instruments. After we enjoyed making homemade pizza and took turns playing the various drums. George led us in a mellow rendering of *The Creator Has A Master Plan* by Leon Thomas and Pharaoh Sanders.

A passion for music and the love to share their special talents as an expression of faith brought two exceptional guests to the youth groups. Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra created and led a lesson on Liturgical Heritage which explored the origins, context and faith expression in African-American Spirituals and Gospel music and the parallel to contemporary world issues. The songs vividly expressed through Jackie Doneghy's inspiring voice, brought to life not only the oppression and pain inflicted with slavery but also the message of enduring hope and faith. We learned about hidden codes and messages within the songs that guided escaped slaves through the Underground Railroad. Jackie also shared the story of her personal journey that touched so many of the youth. We sang, shared a sweet potato pie and enjoyed our time together.

These experiences afford both our youth and parishioners opportunities to make meaningful and very special connections. We are grateful to be blessed with such giving and generous parishioners that bring enlightenment to our youths' faith journey.

“The ancient wisdom found in the labyrinth can be used as a meaningful spiritual tool in contemporary times.” - Arrien

The Labyrinth is an archetype (pattern) found in all religious traditions throughout the world. It has only one path so there are no tricks or dead ends. The path winds throughout and can become a mirror for where we are in our lives. In the Middle Ages walking it substituted for pilgrimages to Jerusalem, The best known labyrinth is in the stone floor of the Cathedral at Chartres in France. There are now over six thousand labyrinths in the United States, in churches, hospitals, and in both inside and outdoor locations.

Come and participate in a field trip to Adrian, Michigan in order to walk the beautiful outdoor labyrinth behind Weber Center on the grounds of the historic Adrian Dominican Motherhouse (an hour's drive from Ann Arbor). Persons need not be members of St. Andrew's to participate. Quite a bit of walking is involved, both in and out of doors; the labyrinth is not accessible by wheelchair.
