Dear friends:

Noise permeates human society. It is almost inescapable. Even if we disconnect from media, electronic devices, turn off the television and radio and retreat to the wilderness (the place John the Baptist chose to “cry out”) there we will always find noise. Even at times when the sounds we expect to hear should be good-natured, there is noise. While grocery shopping for Thanksgiving I observed a frustrated woman have a very loud meltdown when she encountered long check-out lines and few cashiers on duty. Her outburst gave voice to what I, and I’m sure many other shoppers were feeling at that moment.

Holidays (mainly Thanksgiving, Christmas and birthdays, not so much Easter or any of the civic holidays) are something, even now, I approach with a mild sense of trepidation. The source of this has long been clear to me: my mother. Not that I had a bad mother, she was a very good woman who looked after the needs of her family and those around her to the best of ability, often short-changing herself in the process. She went all out for the holidays. As a child of the Depression who was orphaned at a very young age in rural Mississippi, my mother never had a stable home and few of the comforts of family life until she married and started her own family. She then set out to make up for lost time. Holidays became herculean efforts of trying to create a “Norman Rockwell” ideal that lead to frayed nerves, exhaustion and some noisy exchanges in the kitchen that everyone present later regretted. Efforts by various members of the family to convince my mother that a simpler celebration would be just fine, and frankly, appreciated, led nowhere. Some noisy emptiness in my mother’s soul would not allow her to let go of what she thought she should do.

With Thanksgiving just behind us, and Christmas and the New Year within sight we are now in a season of noise making. Some of it we will have little or no control over. Holidays have always had a commercial aspect to it and there’s nothing we can do about that other than to not buy into it any more than we feel we want to. Other noises come from the ongoing tragedies that grab the headlines and leave us feeling powerless. Then there are the noises that come from within – from our homes, our workplaces, and our own souls. That is where we can exercise some control over the volume. For all the sentimentality we have laid over it, the Christmas story can show us how. The first Christmas was full of sound – angels singing, awe-struck shepherds giving praise, and then there’s the baby who must have cried sometime and the mother who gave birth to him in the way mothers always have -- but I wouldn’t call any of it noise. These were all sounds of life, of hope, of expectation. They are sounds we welcome hearing, that fills our souls with joy.

So, this holiday season put what you hear, what you say, what you think to a test: Is it noise? Or is it something I want to hear, or say, or think? If we want less noise in our holidays, in our lives, then we have to stop listening to it, but we also have to replace it with something. As Christians, it is within our power to bring some joy into our world because we already possess the source of it, born in a manger surrounded by the sounds of heaven.

A New Way to Give

If you are 70½ or older and are facing required minimum distributions (RMD) from an IRA, consider making a gift to St. Andrew's through a Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD). A QCD is a withdrawal from an IRA that is sent directly to a charity. A QCD can satisfy a portion or all of your RMD and you may receive certain tax benefits in addition to helping the church. Speak with your financial adviser to learn if this way of giving makes sense for you.


Our Town
