Dear friends:

We may be a month into the new year, but this prayer from the Orthodox tradition could serve as a guide as we say goodbye to a trying 2014, and face a new year that has already presented our world with some hefty challenges. What I appreciate about this prayer is the desire it voices for us to be grounded in the present, in each hour of each day, while trusting that all, including eternity, is in God's hands.

O Lord, grant me to greet the coming day in peace, help me in all things to rely upon your holy will.

In every hour of the day reveal your will to me.

Bless my dealings with all who surround me.

Teach me to treat all that comes to me throughout the day with peace of soul and with firm conviction that your will governs all.

In all my deeds and words, guide my thoughts and feelings.

In unforeseen events, let me not forget that all are sent by you.

Teach me to act firmly and wisely, without embittering and embarrassing others.

Give me strength to bear the fatigue of the coming day with all that it shall bring.

Direct my will, teach me to pray.

And you, yourself, pray in me. Amen. -- St. Philaret of Moscow (1782-1867)

As Lent begins (Ash Wednesday is February 18) a helpful and intentional spiritual discipline might be to consider how we, in our own way, might respond to a world where God's will is constantly challenged, if not downright opposed. The Sunday gospel readings for this season give us an opportunity to reflect on our intentions and actions in this light. And the films I have chosen for the Wednesday evening series all carry a theme of individuals and communities striving to find and act for the good in a confusing and sometimes hostile world.

One way St. Andrew's plans to respond to an ongoing challenge in Ann Arbor is to expand our outreach to the homeless members of our community. In addition to the ministry of the Breakfast and our annual participation in the Rotating Shelter, we along with two other congregations will open our parish hall in the month of March to allow the Delonis Center to provide additional shelter that they cannot physically accommodate during the winter. This program, which started in January at Bethlehem United Church of Christ, is run by the staff at Delonis and was approved by the vestry late last fall. We all want to do what we can to keep some of our most vulnerable neighbors out of the cold this winter. While we have only been asked to provide space there will be opportunities for us to reach out to our guests to help make their stay at St. Andrew's more comfortable. Please watch the Sunday bulletins for announcements. I hope this season of Lent will be a peace-filled time for you, an opportunity to appreciate the gift of time that God has given us, and an occasion to know God's will more deeply in your life.

February 25

The Fisher King

(R, 137 minutes, dramatic comedy)

After hearing a popular DJ rail against yuppies, a madman carries out a massacre in a popular New York bar. Dejected and remorseful, the DJ strikes up a friendship with Parry, a former professor who became unhinged and then homeless after witnessing his wife's violent death in the bar shooting. The DJ seeks redemption by helping Parry in his quest to recover an item that he believes is the Holy Grail and to win the heart of the woman he loves.

March 4

Barbara

(PG-13, 105 minutes, German drama with English subtitles)

In 1980s East Germany, Barbara is a Berlin doctor banished to a country medical clinic for applying for an exit visa. Deeply unhappy with her reassignment and fearful of her co-workers as possible Stasi informants, Barbara stays aloof, especially from the good natured clinic head, Andre. Despite her plans to defect, Barbara learns more about herself and her patients that puts her desires and the people around her in a new light. With her changing perspective, Barbara faces a painful moral dilemma that forces her to choose what she values.

March 11

Salmon Fishing in the Yemen

(PG-13, 107 minutes, romantic comedy)

A visionary sheik believes his passion for the peaceful pastime of salmon fishing can enrich the lives of his people, and he dreams of bringing the sport to the not so fish-friendly desert. Willing to spare no expense, he instructs his representative to turn the dream into reality, an extraordinary feat that will require the involvement of Britain's leading fisheries expert who happens to think the project both absurd and unachievable. That is, until the Prime Minister's overzealous press secretary latches on to it as a 'good will' story. Now, this unlikely team will put it all on the line and embark on an upstream journey of faith and fish to prove the impossible, possible.

Where Do We Go Now?

(PG-13, 110 minutes,

Arabic dramatic comedy with English subtitles)

Christians and Muslims lived peacefully together for years in this small Lebanese village, but animosities begin to build among the men as a result of slights and misunderstandings. The women of the village conspire to avert sectarian strife, but their efforts fail in slowing down the escalating spiral of violence. When tragedy strikes, the women find themselves driven to desperate measures for the sake of peace.

Acclaimed by choruses and listeners alike, composer Morten Laurdisen's musical mastery delivers a gift born in the quiet splendor of his home on a remote island in the Pacific Northwest. This documentary offers a rare glimpse into the composer's reflections and personal creative space.

Please join us for the Church School's annual pre-Lenten Carnivale. Everyone is invited to the celebration on Sunday, February 8, from 11:30 am to 12:30 pm in the Parish Hall. (This event is a week earlier than the traditional Sunday before Ash Wednesday to accommodate the school systems mid-winter break schedules and the availability of our volunteers.) Each class hosts an activity or game, cake walk, mask making, fabulous face painting by Miss Val and a delicious meal. We also create a long banner for the Alleluia Scroll. Enjoy music, beads, food, prizes and more beads all in this Mardi Gras themed event. Most events are free, but there is small cost for the cake walk (Rite 13) and a free-will donation is appreciated for the J2A special pancake breakfast. Proceeds from these events are used for future pilgrimage journeys.

We extend a warm welcome to all the children and families that attend the 9:15 Family Eucharist as well as the Church School children in pre-school through early elementary ages. We have a special Valentine party planned on Sunday, February 15, 9:45 to 11:15 am. Ash Wednesday, February 18

4:30 pm: Family Service

Each year we have a special Ash Wednesday service for children and families, marking the beginning of Lent. The Junior Choir sings and the Church School volunteers as readers and in other roles. The "Alleluia Scroll" (created at Carnivale on February 8) will be buried in the undercroft of the church by the children attending the 4:30 pm Ash Wednesday service. This symbolic act reflects the unspoken status of the "alleluia" word during Lent. On Easter Sunday, the Alleluia Scroll will be resurrected, placed in the chapel and we will all voice a joyful "Alleluia."

Seder Meal

Sunday, March 22

Last year's spiritual and meaningful Seder Meal experience will be repeated on Sunday, March 22. The Seder is a ritual meal which commemorates the events of the Exodus story and for us, reflects the Christian tradition of Christ's last supper.

Lenten Caring & Sharing

Each Lenten season the children are asked to save their coins, from being helpers around the house and doing good deeds, in support of an Easter offering for our foster child Joveline Devil of Trou du Nord, Haiti. Treasure boxes will be distributed in early Lent. Please bring the boxes on Easter Sunday and place them in the white cross outside of the Chapel.

Children, if someone offers you a little money for a good deed, let them know you would not normally take it, but you have a special friend that could really use the donation for her education and health. Thank them for their kindness.

This year the Church School added special outreach projects during both Advent and Lent. The Lenten project earmarks the Church school's particular effort and mirrors the annual Breakfast Program Footcare products collected and distributed to guests on Maundy Thursday. The Church School will collect personal items needed for a local organization. The specifics are forthcoming.

A special thank you goes to Linda Hastings for leading the class of 2nd & 3rd graders in an Advent project for the Breakfast Guests. They sewed 130 red miniature felt Christmas stockings. They were decoratively overstitched with white floss and were filled with candies and treats. Thank you Linda, Jean and the children of the 2nd & 3rd grade classroom for taking on such a big project and for your outward pouring of TLC for our Breakfast guest friends.

Childcare during Holy Week

Childcare will be provided during Holy Week. Specific dates and times will be announced as we draw closer. Look for updates on the church website, in the weekly bulletins, and the Church School email announcements.

In our Rite 13 class, during the early winter months, the second unit "Society" explores ways groups define themselves, group norms, social issues, and our call as a Christian community. They will work towards Bible literacy and examine ways in which liturgy, music and art are used to express aspects of faith.

During Lent, Rite 13 will participate in a World Awareness lesson, designed to explore some of the dynamics that create hunger and poverty in the world. The lesson focuses on "compassion and acts of mercy", guides our youth in determining a Christian response to these conditions. The class members will need to reflect, discern and challenge their assumptions in this highly powerful and compelling lesson. With the large group of 25 students, this will be an interesting and lively exercise.

Carnivale, our annual pre-Lenten festivity on February 8, is a venue of fundraising for two youth groups. Rite 13 hosts the cake walk and J2A provides a pancake breakfast with a free-will donation to support their Pilgrimage in June 2016. As always your support is greatly appreciated.

J2A continues to learn adult skills and affirmations in their lessons to help guide them in their strengths and abilities, affording stronger teaming and most importantly a stronger commitment to their faith journey. They are learning so much about working towards a common goal during this phase of the program.

YAC will conclude their Confirmation preparation classes with Fr. Alan at the end of March. The previous four years of study in the Journey to Adulthood curriculum has built a solid foundation of support. This year has provided the framework for an interactive and personal process of discernment that affirms the sacrament of Confirmation as an adult decision of faith and choice.

Guest Presenter on Identity & Vocation

We've had a number of guest presenters address our youth groups; Elizabeth Kurtz, a Groundcover News vendor discussed homelessness, Rachel Ferguson addressed her own Confirmation discernment process, and now we will be joined by Joe Chapman, who was part of the Rite 13 teaching team last year. He has since stepped down from teaching for this year as he is now quite busy preparing for seminary in the fall of 2015. Joe connected very well with the teens and will be an upcoming guest speaker. He will present a Journey to Adulthood Program lesson on "Identity & Vocation" and address the entire youth group about his calling and vocation discernment journey.
