Dear friends:

Prayer is hard. I'm not telling you anything you don't already know, but it's something you probably don't hear priests and pastors admit to very often. Perhaps we should, because there is no getting around that fact if you want prayer to be a serious and nourishing part of your life. This reality was brought home to me, again, when I saw an article about a church in California that has decided they would not pray in their public worship for the new President by name, but only by his title. (Some of you may remember that was the practice of the Episcopal Church until the introduction of the current Prayer Book in 1979). I recall that in 2000 and 2008 other churches made similar moves when the nation saw the elections of new presidents after contentious campaigns. This has probably been the reaction somewhere, in some congregation, throughout the history of the Republic. All of these churches have had their reasons for not praying for the President by name and I'm sure their decisions were not made lightly. But it is sad to think that some of our fellow citizens and fellow Christians can't bring themselves to pray for someone with whom they disagree. If we feel that way about an individual in the White House, then how do we handle someone in a house down the block who thinks and acts differently than we do?

Are we being truly diligent in prayer, hard, heartfelt prayer, if we can't even use the name of the person for whom we are praying no matter what we think of them? Expressions of anger, disappointment, fear, along with petition, intercession and thanksgiving all have a place in the practice of prayer. But does God want us to use prayer as an act of protest?

If anyone is in need of prayer it is the leader of a nation, whether that nation is the United States or Tuvalu. If we find ourselves in opposition to our nation's leaders then our prayers, and our faithful obligation to offer them, become even more important because of the effect prayer can have. As has been said, "Praying shapes believing," and if we limit our prayers to only what we want or what we like, our spiritual life will be the poorer for it.

Another truth that priests and pastors don't talk about enough is that the purpose of our prayers for others is not so much to change them or their hearts, but to change our own. That, too, is hard. It is work few of us would eagerly engage because it often requires us to look at parts of ourselves we would prefer to avoid. Yet if we don't then where will that leave us? If our hearts become immune to change then our prayers will become little more than talking to ourselves. If we are simply looking for agreement then we will undoubtedly find it. But if we are looking for something more, say, a community, a connection, a deeper understanding, then we have to be willing to open our hearts to others. Finding new ways to do that could make for some very interesting and fruitful prayer time.

Stewardship: 2017 Annual Giving Campaign

Dear Friends,

As in years past, the Annual Giving campaign (which begins in the previous Fall) has extended into the new year, as we are still striving to receive financial pledges from many families for 2017.

Our perennial campaign goal of \$900,000 represents a budget that would comfortably cover St. Andrew's current ministry scope and needs, while also enabling the opportunity for us to consider meeting other needs that could help to significantly enhance St. Andrew's and the community it serves. If you look at the budget by ministry, you will see that almost all of our costs are fixed: utilities, building insurance, and staff. And similar to your own household, these costs tend to rise every year.

We are very grateful to those of you who have already pledged, and hope that those families who have not yet turned in your pledge card will take a few minutes to fill it out and return it to the church. You can always bring the card to church and drop it in the offering plate or put it in the mail in the envelope provided. If you need another card, please feel free to contact the office and we will happily mail another.

If your pledge is automatically withdrawn from your account on a monthly basis we still need your signed card to continue to make these withdrawals (or- an email to Kathy in the church office to authorize continued automated payments, kmcperson@standrewsaa.org)

If you are new to the parish, or if you typically place your offering in the plate but do not complete a pledge card, it is the committee's hope that you will complete a card this year. The Finance Committee and Vestry are trying to determine a realistic budget for 2017, and having an estimate of expected pledge contributions from each family greatly facilitates this budget process.

At its essence, financial stewardship is about recognizing the importance in your life of God's love and His earthly work; and then making a commitment to honor and reinforce that love and work with a pledge of your resources and gifts. However, St. Andrew's would never ask you to put its needs above that of your family. Making a pledge is not akin to a binding financial commitment. If for whatever reason during the course of the year your situation changes and you need to change the amount or even cancel your pledge, you are free to do so. Please just notify the church office so that we can make the necessary adjustments to the operating budget.

As Fr. Alan has said, "The kind of financial commitment we make to the Church reflects our own joy and gentleness for our brothers and sisters – a decision that is completely under our control."

May God continue to bless you and the ministries of St. Andrew's.



The popular Dinner and Movie program returns on the Wednesday evenings in Lent. "Life is a journey, not a destination," is this year's theme. Beginning with Evensong at 6:00 pm, the evening continues with a pot-luck supper in the Parish Hall at 6:30 pm. (Fr. Alan will make a big pot of vegetarian soup. Please bring a side dish, salad, or dessert to share.) After we have served ourselves we will watch the movie while we eat. Due to the length of some of the films we will begin our viewing promptly at 6:45 pm.

March 8: *Now, Voyager*

(Not rated, 117 minutes, drama)

Charlotte Vale suffers under the domination of her Boston matron mother until a visit to a sanitarium begins her transformation into an elegant, independent woman. On a South American cruise she falls in love with an architect and upon returning home embarks on a journey she could not have anticipated. From Hollywood's golden age, this film stars Bette Davis and Paul Henreid.

March 15: *Everything is Illuminated* (PG-13, 106 minutes, comic drama)

Jonathan, a young Jewish American travels to Ukraine in search of his grandfather's past. He has a photograph and the name of a village. He hires Odessa Heritage Tours, made up of a gruff old man and his English-speaking grandson. The three, plus grandfather's deranged dog, travel into the heart of a Ukraine that has all but vanished.

March 22: *O' Horton* (PG-13, 90 minutes, Norwegian comic drama, English subtitles)

Horton, a dependable and contained train engineer is retiring after 40 years of service. On the night of his retirement dinner, Horton falls into a series of strange experiences that make him question how he should live the rest of his life.

March 29: *Sliding Doors*

(PG-13, 139 minutes, comic drama)

A London woman's love life and career both hinge, unknown to her, on whether or not she catches a train.

April 5: *Hector and the Search for Happiness* (R, 114 minutes, comedy)

Hector "has it all" – a successful psychiatry practice, a beautiful home and a loving girlfriend. But he is frustrated that he can't provide his patients with happiness. Hector decides to travel the globe in search of this mysterious emotion.

Ash Wednesday, March 1

The Family Service at 4:30 pm is a special service for children and families. At the conclusion of the service, worshipers proceed to the undercroft to bury the "Alleluia Scroll" created at Carnivale. This symbolic ritual helps children "say

goodbye" to the Alleluia which is not spoken or sung during Lent. We put the "alleluia" away - like putting away a favorite toy for a while so we appreciate it more when we bring it back. On Easter Sunday, the Alleluia Scroll will be resurrected from its undercroft tomb and placed in the chapel when we once again sing a joyful praise of "Alleluia."

Outreach Caring & Sharing

Hope for Haiti was a great success! The children in preschool through elementary grades made reindeer candy canes for a donation which raised \$165 to send to Episcopal Relief and Development for Hurricane Matthew aid.

Joveline turns 18

This will be the last time we are able to support our foster sister Joveline Devil in Haiti as she is now 18 years old and leaves this particular program. Caring and sharing in this way along with created cards, photos and children saving their own coins affords a tremendous learning and special connection with someone we only see in a photo. It helps us to know we can do one small gesture of support, right here in Ann Arbor, and still make a huge difference in the life of Joveline even though she lives far away and we may never meet her.

The Church School provides \$380 to Plan USA each year for sponsorship of a foster child. The funds could use a boost! A contribution of \$2 from each child/youth would go a long way to meeting our Lent offering goal.

The past two years during Lent a Seder meal and lesson was shared as a large assembly by the entire Church School. This year, the children will take part in a more intimate setting with each classroom having their own meal and reflection on Lent incorporating elements of the Seder with the Christian tradition of Christ's last supper. Each class will cover a series of lessons that shares the stories of Jesus' baptism, his ministry, miracles and the great parables. The weeks in Lent we'll retell the events of Holy Week leading to the Easter story in April.

Tales from the Journey

During Lent, the Rite 13 and J2A will participate in a World Awareness lesson, exploring hunger and poverty in the world. The lessons focus on “compassion and acts of mercy” challenging their assumptions and guiding the youth in determining a Christian response to these conditions. This exercise unfolds in a most unique way of reflection, self-awareness and discernment. With the large combined group of 35 students, this will be a dynamic activity.

Rite 13

Rite 13 studies have focused on Compassion and Acts of Mercy, including issues and concerns of the classes choosing. Lessons on ‘Images of God’ and ‘I Am Made In God’s Image’ explore specifics such as ‘My Gifts & Abilities,’ ‘Opening the Heart & Showing the Real Me,’ ‘Talking to God,’ ‘Listening to God,’ and ‘What is Prayer’. This youngest group in the youth program is learning the ropes of volunteering at the Breakfast along with learning about the dynamics of group norms. This next session will include greater focus on the New Testament and the Book of Common Prayer.

J2A

J2A continues to learn adult skills and affirmations in their lessons to help guide them in their strengths and abilities, affording stronger teamwork and most importantly a stronger commitment to their faith journey. They have learned so much this first term in working towards a common goal with the opportunity to participate in several fundraisers. Their lessons center on the themes of Self and Society, discussing the concepts of identity, dependency, independence and purpose, while exploring respect for oneself and others. They have discussed how

their experiences have enabled them to understand and articulate their emerging selves, hopefully, recognizing self-worth comes from God.

YAC

YAC class members will complete their confirmation preparation classes with Fr. Alan, meeting in the Library at 9:45 am on February 5, March 12, 26, and April 23. This year provides the framework for an interactive and personal process of discernment that affirms the sacrament of Confirmation as an adult decision of faith and choice. For the final class in April, parents are invited to attend the “reflection” as shared by each confirmand in this last step of discernment.

High School Seniors

Our high school seniors, continue to evolve in their roles in the many different ministries as Young Adults in the Church (YAC) and as volunteers on the fifth Sunday at the Breakfast Program. The previous five years of study in the Journey to Adulthood curriculum has built a solid foundation of support and provided the framework for their next major piece of work, growing their understanding of who God has called them to be as they prepare for high school graduation. Organ Update

In November 2015 the Vestry authorized Richards, Fowkes & Co. to build a new organ for St. Andrew's. It will be a beautiful instrument, sited in the north-eastern corner of the church. Built to last for generations to come, the new instrument will be a 'tracker' organ, giving us an instrument to enjoy for many years.

The Organ Committee has been working hard to raise funds to cover the approximately \$1.875 million it will take to build and install the new instrument. In one-on-one meetings and in small groups we've presented the project to members of the parish, asking everyone to prayerfully consider offering financial support for the building of this organ. To date some 120 households in the parish, representing well over 200 people, have pledged or donated a total of \$1,516,000 toward the project. This is excellent progress, and we are tremendously grateful for the generous support that the congregation has offered.

We have approximately \$283,000 to raise. If you and your family are interested in joining with us in bringing this project to a successful conclusion, here's what's to come:

- On Sunday, January 29, at the Annual Parish Meeting we will offer a full update for members of the congregation, after which we will launch a public campaign that is meant to build toward the conclusion the fundraising campaign.
- Throughout February we will give a series of pulpit talks during the Sunday services to give more information about the project.
- On Sunday, February 26, members of the congregation will be invited to pledge toward the organ project.
- And finally, on Sunday, May 21 at 4:00 pm, the St. Andrew's Adult Choir and the Vocal Arts Ensemble, accompanied by the Ann Arbor Camerata, will present the complete *Missa Cellensis* of Haydn. This will be the final public event of the organ fundraising campaign. Tickets will be \$20.
