An Announcement from Bishop Gibbs

January 9, 2018

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven."

Dear Sisters and Brothers of The Diocese of Michigan:

In September of 1999, one of the questions asked of me during the "walk-about" was: "you're young; you could be a bishop a long time! If you were elected, how long would you be our bishop?" My response was, "as long as I believe God is calling me to be here. I have always been committed to following where God calls me."

On February 5th of this year, I will begin my 19th year as a bishop in God's holy Church. I have served as your Bishop Diocesan since November 1, 2000. After much prayerful discernment, I have heard God's call to move into retirement. Therefore, in consultation with The Standing Committee of the Diocese and in conversation with the Diocesan Staff, I am calling for the election of the 11th Bishop of Michigan. It is my intention to resign effective December 31, 2019; and, in conversation with the Office of the Presiding Bishop, the ordination and consecration of the next Bishop of Michigan is expected to occur in February 2020.

I know that some of you might feel that I am "too young" to retire. At the time that I step down as your bishop I will be three months shy of my 66th birthday and, I will have given nearly 33 years of service as an ordained leader in the Church. The time is right for me to spend more time with family and friends who have graciously shared me with the Church for many years and to enjoy other lifelong passions.

It has been a distinct honor to serve as your bishop. You have taught me so much about what it means to be Beloved Community. My own faith has strengthened as I have served with and learned in partnership with you. This is still very much a ministry I love with the depth of my being.

The Standing Committee recently met with the Rt. Rev. Todd Ousley, from The Episcopal Church Office of Pastoral Development. In this role, Bishop Ousley is tasked with providing support and guidance to dioceses as they journey through times of episcopal transition. While it has been nearly 20 years since the diocese has experienced a transition in the bishop's office, I am confident that with the able leadership of the Standing Committee you will journey well and faithfully.

Meanwhile, we have two years of ministry ahead of us. We have much to do as we continue to remain faithful to the call of God in our lives as individuals and as part of the Jesus Movement in southeast Michigan. During this time, I ask your prayers for the Standing Committee and all those who will have roles in keeping this time of transition focused. I ask your prayers for the Diocesan Staff who continue to work and minister on your behalf. I also ask your prayers for Karlah and for me as we travel this time with you; I promise we will keep you in ours.

SERIES

The popular Dinner and Movie program returns on the Wednesday evenings in Lent. Beginning with Evensong at 6:00 pm, the evening continues with a pot-luck supper in the Parish Hall at 6:30 pm. (Fr. Alan will make a big pot of vegetarian soup. Please bring a side dish, salad, or dessert to share.) After we have served ourselves we will watch the movie while we eat. Due to the length of some of the films we will begin our viewing promptly at 6:45 pm.

February 21: *Paper Man*

(R, 110 minutes, comic drama)

A coming-of-middle-age tale of an unlikely friendship between a struggling author and a Long Island teenager who teaches him a thing or two about growing up.

February 28: *Valentin*

(PG-13, 86 minutes, Argentinian drama, English subtitles)

An eight-year-old boy, who aspires to be an astronaut, lives with his grandmother in Buenos Aires in the late 1960s. He also dreams of being reunited with his mother, who is separated from Valentin’s largely-absent father who uses him to attract new girlfriends like the attractive Leticia, whom Valentin himself befriends.

March 7: *20 Feet from Stardom*

(PG-13, 91 minutes, Documentary)

The backup singer is always in the shadow of the feature artists while providing a vital foundation for the music. Through interviews with veterans and concert footage, the history of these predominately African-American singers is explored. A special focus is given to stand outs who endeavor to make a living in the music world facing the very different challenge of singing in the spotlight themselves.

March 14: *Ida*

(PG-13, 82 minutes, Polish drama, English Subtitles)

A young novice nun in 1960s Poland is on the verge of taking her vows when she is forced to confront the history of her family that she never had the opportunity to know.

March 21: *About Time*

(R, 124 minutes, British romantic comedy/fantasy)

Tim’s father shares a family secret with his son – the men in the family have the ability to travel through time. Tim can’t change history, but he can change what has happened in his own life. He decides to make his world a better place and learns about making the most out of life.

Will You Watch with Me?

Keeping the Watch at St. Andrew's:

Thursday, March 29 - Friday, March 30

Our Lord Jesus Christ asked his disciples to Watch with him as he prayed in the garden at Gethsemane just hours before he was arrested and taken away ultimately to be crucified. From this has evolved the tradition of Keeping the Watch between the services of Maundy Thursday (March 29) and Good Friday (March 30). In many Christian communities throughout the world, church members take turns keeping watch in quiet prayer. All members of St. Andrew's will have the opportunity to participate in this tradition in our church this year.

At the end of the Maundy Thursday Eucharist, the Blessed Sacrament of bread and wine will be taken in procession to the Chapel, our Altar of Repose, where our watch will begin. You are invited to sign up for any half-hour or hour from the end of the service until 10:00 pm or from 6:00 am on Friday until our Good Friday service begins. From personal experience I can tell you that Keeping the Watch can be a most meaningful experience in the observation of Holy Week.

We ask you to sign up for a time that you would like to keep Watch - we want to be sure that every slot has at least two people Keeping the Watch. The sign up sheets will be near the Chapel door.

Church School Happenings

Carnivale *February 11*

The entire parish is invited to the Church School sponsored pre-Lenten party, Carnivale on Sunday, February 11, from 11:30 am to 12:30 pm in the Parish Hall. Share in the annual Mardi Gras themed festivities with a J2A pancake breakfast, music, crafts, games, and beads galore. Each classroom hosts an activity; cake walk, mask making, fabulous face painting and a delicious meal. The Alleluia Scroll is created and later buried in the undercroft on Ash Wednesday. A free-will donation is appreciated for the Rite 13 cake walk and the J2A pancake breakfast to help support their pilgrimage journey.

Baked Goodies Needed for Rite 13 Carnivale Cake Walk

Baked good donations are needed and greatly appreciated in support of the Rite 13 Cake Walk at Carnivale. Ash Wednesday *February 14*

The Family Service at 4:30 pm is a special service for children and families. The Junior Choir sings and the Church School volunteers as readers and in other roles. At the conclusion of the service, worshippers proceed to the undercroft to bury the "Alleluia Scroll" created at Carnivale. This symbolic ritual helps children "say goodbye" to the Alleluia which is not spoken or sung during Lent. We put the "alleluia" away - like putting away a favorite toy for a while so we appreciate it more when we bring it back. On Easter Sunday, the Alleluia Scroll will be resurrected from its undercroft tomb and placed in the chapel when we once again sing a joyful praise of "Alleluia."

Outreach Caring & Sharing

We had a very successful Advent offering for our newest foster child Kalid of Ethiopia. We still need to reach our goal of

\$380 and ask children to save their coins during Lent for the Easter Offering. Mite boxes are available in the classrooms and can be placed on the large white cross located outside the Chapel. Please include your name on the mite box so we can acknowledge your gift.

The children make Valentine cards to send to our homebound parishioners. This has become an annual activity for us. Caring and sharing in this way along with created cards, photos and saving their own coins help children learn even one small kind gesture of outreach and caring brings joy to others near and far.

Wiggles & Worship *Happenings in the Classroom*

The 2nd and 3rd grade class is all about a highly interactive group of 12 children who are so engaged in their lessons. They enjoy the ritual of gathering time for a hands-on activity, generally an accompanying craft relating to that week's Bible story. It might be an oil lamp made from clay, a star, a luminary or it may be a game or even building a temple from cardboard bricks and tubes. Can you identify the Bible story relating to these crafts? The children can recount these stories and welcome any questions. This class enjoys the varied multi-sensory ways of learning the Lord's Prayer. They are eager learners and love to read from the Discoverer's Bible. Primary age children's social skills are developing and their enlarged social awareness helps them to associate the Bible stories with their own families, friends and community. Gathered around the main table, you will often see them in a lively conversation, taking turns speaking and listening. They make use of a Learner's Book that recaps the scripture into a story narrative. The lessons are seasonably compatible with the Sunday Lectionary but are not based on the weekly readings. The most recent series of lessons covered Judges/Kings after the death of Moses, People in Parables and in the current winter session, Eucharist - People in Communion learning nature and meaning of the Church's celebration of the Eucharist. A clothesline strung across the windows hold colorful pictures of



the Hebrew people in the Old Testament; Joshua, Ruth, Solomon, Gideon and in the New Testament the people in Jesus' Parables and serves as a summary of all the stories that have heard.

Lent

During Lent, the Morning Glories pre-school class will share the wonderful Parables of Jesus. The primary grades lessons retell the events of Holy Week in greater detail. Intermediate grades begin a unit on "Sacraments: The Eucharist as Shared Life and People in Communion." Following last year's Christian Passover, the children will take part in this intimate setting once again with each classroom having their own meal and reflection on Lent incorporating elements of the Seder and Christ's last supper followed by the Easter story in April.

Weave Your Way into a Prayer Loom *Visit the Chapel!*

Come share as a Church family with a visual prayer representation in "the prayer loom." Please visit the Prayer Loom in the Chapel "where prayer and story merge into a multi-sensory manifestation and powerful expression of prayer." Colorful yarn skeins, will be available to weave around the nail heads and through each persons' weavings. We hope you will be a part of this shared experience!

Here is a story about a prayer loom: "At the end of the evening, the loom was filled with the prayers of a whole room of people. One of the more active boys started to bounce his body against the loom, over and over again. My first temptation was to stop him, but instead I hung back and watched. William leaned all of his weight onto those criss-crossed yarn. When our eyes met, he announced with delight, "Look Emily! All these prayers can hold me up!" That was it. William totally got it. Prayers offered up with love and connection can hold all of us up, literally and figuratively." This year we'll find Jesus starting his ministry in "Christ's Chosen" 27 A.D. when children through 5th grade share family time in one of the 12 tribes. The ever-faithful volunteers bring to life Bible times in the most realistic setting possible. The event is not only a fantastically fun event it is free. Bring a friend too!

Tales from the Journey

Carnivale, our annual pre-Lenten festivity on Sunday, February 11, is a venue of fundraising for two youth groups. Rite 13 hosts the cake walk for a nominal charge and J2A provides a pancake breakfast. A free-will donation to support their Pilgrimage in June, 2018 is greatly appreciated.

Last year's spiritual and meaningful Christian Passover in the elementary grades will be expanded to include the youth groups. They will each hold separate meals in their own classroom combining the elements of the Seder, a ritual meal which commemorates the events of the Exodus story and reflects the Christian tradition of Christ's last supper. J2A is planning a visit to Canterbury House as well.

Rite 13 and J2A are both in the last two terms of their respective two-year cycles in the Journey to Adulthood youth program. The two units Health Relationships/Sexuality and Spirituality are timely topics as R13 prepares for their Celebration - The Gifts of Manhood and Womanhood in May and J2A readies for their Pilgrimage in June.

The lessons are approached in varied depth and breadth depending on the age group. The youth will consider: the ways we love, examine what our culture tells us about sexuality and how much of it we truly believe, observe gender proving in action and understand the effect that stars/celebrities have on our culture and our perceptions, and sexual stereotyping. They'll consider what it means to have a

healthy relationship, reflect on sexuality as a special gift from God, examine ways in which we actively approach God and ways in which God actively engages us. They'll discuss what does it mean to be a person who lives in an on-going relationship with God and in particular the disciplines which comprise a faithful life.

YAC

The YAC 11th and 12th grade young adults will continue to reflect on the dynamics of relationships, boundaries and social expectations. We'll encourage critical thinking skills and invite the group to question the values of the culture and those around them as well as where the values come from and who benefits from them. They'll continue to discern and decide employing tools to navigate these exciting but challenging times. These are complex and delicate topics but fortunately the group took a breather to enjoy a breakfast outing after recently volunteering at the breakfast program.

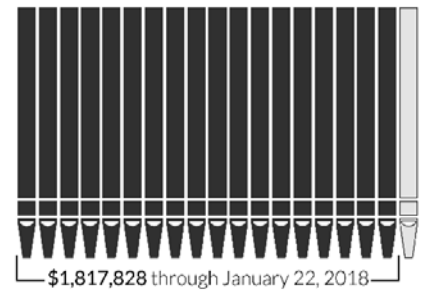
