Dear friends,

Like a lot of people my age, I grew up watching *Star Trek* with my dad, going to see *Star Wars* with my sisters, and later reading and watching Carl Sagan's *Cosmos*. The idea of deep space exploration and the possibility of life beyond our planet remains fascinating to me, and I'm enjoying astrophysicist Adam Frank's new *The Little Book of Aliens*.

Frank recounts wanting to be an astronomer from a very young age, fascinated by his father's collection of science fiction magazines with cover illustrations of astronauts encountering aliens on far-off planets. When he was in graduate school in the 1980's, SETI, the search for extraterrestrial intelligence, was really on the margins of the field, without much funding or respect. Now, that has changed. He writes:

As you read these words, the human species is poised at the edge of its greatest and most important journey. Over the past three decades, the scientific search for life in the universe--a field called *astrobiology*--has exploded. We've discovered planets everywhere in the galaxy, and we've figured out how and where to look for signs of alien life in the atmospheres of these new worlds. We've also looked deep into Earth's almost four-billion-year history as an inhabited world. From this view we've gained new and powerful insights into how planets and life evolve together.


I still find the possibility of life beyond our planet fascinating, and Frank's book has prompted me to wonder about its theological implications. How would we, as Christians, describe our path to the God of creation to a form of alien life that hasn't experienced the life, ministry, and death of Jesus? What pathways to the divine do other forms of life follow? Are wonder, awe, gratitude, curiosity, and compassion universal spiritual practices?

In an interview in the *Rochester Review*, Frank is asked "Does studying the possibilities of life in the universe make you more or less appreciative of what exists here on Earth? He responds:

Look, the world is a mess. We can be so horrible to each other! That's why I want people to understand how amazing we are and how amazing the world is. If we just had more appreciation for how extraordinary this world and this universe is, maybe we'd spend less time yelling at each other and more time just having a sense of awe. Science is a(n)...antidote to the endless anger and recrimination that happens with human beings.

In awe of the miracle of the creation of each of you.




