Dear friends:

This fall the lectionary gives us several weeks-worth of readings from the Letter of James. One of the more controversial books of the New Testament, it is one of my favorites. James is a brief but wide-ranging text filled with ethical pronouncements on how Christians should live, individually and as a community. Sometime when you have fifteen minutes to spare, read it. Basically, it is a common-sense message: the state of our heart and soul is reflected by our words and actions -- we must discipline and take responsibility for both. As with most texts of this nature it has to be taken in its entirety. It is hard to isolate and focus on one passage without losing the larger picture. James is concerned with the entire person, the Church as a whole.

Such a "big picture" approach has never been popular. Smaller details, catchy phrases, specialization, simple ideas, have always been an easier mode for most of us to manage. Over time we have become very proficient at it. Within my lifetime slogans were replaced by bumper stickers, which were replaced by sound bites, which have been replaced by Tweets. (At least with Twitter one is afforded 140 characters, which neither a sound bite nor a bumper sticker can accommodate). But don't we long for more, something more substantive spiritually, personally, socially, politically?

Would Jesus have used something like Twitter if it had been available? Perhaps. He did employ a popular communication method for his time -- the parable -- in order to get his message across. But just a brief survey of the teachings of Jesus shows that Twitter would probably not have worked well for him. Some significant and memorable sayings would fit into the 140 character limitations of a tweet -- John 3:16, Matthew 6:24, Mark 12:17, Luke 8:21 come to mind. The Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-11) could work if each "Blessed" were broken out in isolation, but that doesn't seem to be the way Jesus presented them. The Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13, the version most commonly used) does not make it; though the version in Luke 11:2-4 almost does. None of the parables (especially in Luke), none of the teachings on status (Matthew 18:1-4), anxiety (Luke 12:22-31), eternal life (John 6:35-40), how to set priorities (Matthew 22:37-40), discipleship (Luke 9:23-26) could be found on Jesus' Twitter feed.

I'm not trying to rail against technology. (I'm not sufficiently proficient with technology to do that). I am trying to make the case for doing the work that is required to have a substantive life spiritually, personally, socially, and politically. It takes time, and commitment, and a willingness to go beyond what is delivered to our screens. It takes building real relationships.

By and large, Jesus is not long-winded; his teachings are concise. Yet there is substance to them based on his desire to go beyond the surface with us to get to the hearts and minds God has given us. Do you get that from most of what comes across those little devices that command so much of our attention? If not, Jesus offers an alternative (Luke 11:9-10).

Dear Friends:

With the approach of the fall season, the St. Andrew's Annual Giving Campaign is now underway. This annual parish drive asking for your 2019 financial commitment to the Church provides more than 80% of revenue for all of St. Andrew's vital ministries and operations. Our core ministries – Worship & Music, Buildings & Grounds, Christian Formation, Outreach – depend on the support we provide through our pledges to the parish and the larger Church.

We hope that all of our parishioners will make a formal pledge, of any amount, to achieve a goal of \$900,000 to fund the ministry of St. Andrew's for the coming year.

Alan in letters, and from different parishioners who have shared their personal reflections on stewardship and the importance of this campaign. It is now time for you to take part in this most special ministry, truly an unselfish act of Christian love and sacrifice.

Join us in making a commitment to St. Andrew's financial future on Pledge Sunday, October 21. We look forward

with hope, and thank you for your commitment to St. Andrew's, our shared spiritual home.

Flu Shots/Drug Dump

Sunday, October 21: 8:30 to 11:00 am

To increase effectiveness, four influenza strains are covered in this vaccine. Adults with chronic diseases are especially encouraged to have the flu vaccine.

The HVNS accepts BC/BS, Aetna, Cigna and Medicaid/MI-Child; Medicare, Blue Care Network, Priority Health, and HAP are also accepted with no co-pay required. Or you can self-pay for \$33 (cash, check or credit cards). No appointment is required.

At that time we will accept unused, unopened, and not-expired glucose sticks for donation to the Hope Clinic in Ypsilanti. We will also confidentially accept any prescriptions or OTC items **except for the following:** Narcotics or DEA Controlled Substances, sunscreens, insect repellents, cosmetics, tobacco, hydrogen peroxide, rubbing alcohol, aerosol cans, IV bags, needles or sharps.

Please leave medications in their original containers. *To protect your privacy, black-out any personal information on the label*, but make sure the drug name is still visible. There is no fee for this collection, and you are welcome to participate regardless of whether or not you are getting a flu shot! Medical Decision Making Event

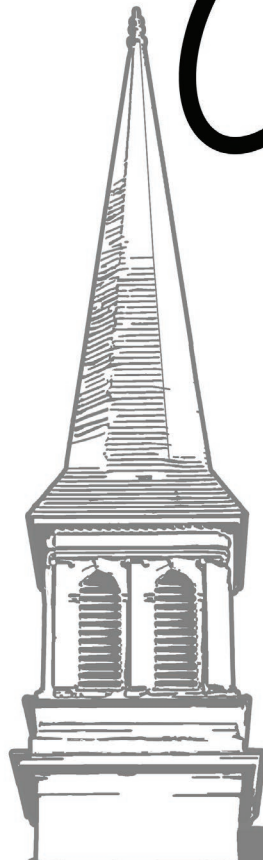
Sunday, November 11 at 11:30 am
