As we enter into the last two months before the election I would like to share with you a recent statement from our Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry.

"This November we will gather together as a nation to vote not only to elect a new president but to elect governmental leaders on a variety of levels.

We are blessed. We are blessed as a nation to be able to do so as citizens of this country. This is a right, an obligation, and a duty. And indeed the right and the privilege to be able to vote is something that was won through an American revolution. Something that was won even more through civil rights and women's suffrage. A right and a privilege that was won for all. So I encourage you to please go and vote. Vote your conscience. Vote your perspective. But vote.

But it's not just simply a civil obligation and duty. Voting and participation in our government is a way of participating in our common life. And that is a Christian obligation. Indeed, we who follow in the Way of Jesus of Nazareth are summoned to participate actively as reflections of our faith in the civil process.

In the thirteenth chapter of Romans, sometimes a chapter that is debated among scholars and among Christians, St. Paul reminds us that we have a duty and an obligation to participate in the process of government, "For that is how our common life is ordered and structured." And at one point he actually says, "For the same reason," going on, he's expanding, he says, "For the same reason you also pay taxes for the authorities are God's servants, busy with everything." That's probably very true. "Pay to all them that is due them. Taxes to whom taxes are due. Revenue to whom revenue is due. Respect to whom respect is due. Honor to whom honor is due." Now he's talking about the role of government as helping to order our common life. But here's what I want you to really hear.

He continues and says:

"So owe no-one anything except to love one another. For the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments 'You shall not commit adultery', 'You shall not murder', 'You shall not steal', 'You shall not covet', any other commandment, they are all summed up in this word: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'. Love does no wrong to a neighbor, therefore love is the fulfilling of the law."

For St. Paul, the way of love, the love of neighbor, is the fulfilling not only of the moral law of God, but the way to fulfill the civil law.

Go and vote. Vote your conscience. Your conscience informed by what it means to love your neighbor. To participate in the process of seeking the common good. To participate in the process of making this a better world. However you vote, go and vote. And do that as a follower of Jesus.

Stewardship: 2017 Annual Giving Campaign

The 2017 Annual Giving Campaign is underway. In pulpit talks this fall some of your fellow parishioners will describe why and how St. Andrew's is an important part of their life. We hope these reflections will be helpful in your contemplation of our parish's meaning and value in your life — discerning how you might support St. Andrew's through your own personal gifts of time, talent, and treasure.

The St. Andrew's Annual Giving Campaign is our annual parish drive asking for your financial commitment to the Church based on the spiritual value you hold for our parish and the larger Church. This campaign is the principle source of revenue that supports our clergy, administration, and our ministries, maintains the buildings and equipment, sustains the quality and the character of our community, and makes available those vital resources for spiritual and temporal guidance and assistance during times of special need.

St. Andrew's operating finances are challenged each year because pledge and plate income do not cover expenses. Unanticipated gifts at the end of the year have sometimes closed the gap we saw in January. However, this is not always the case; as a consequence, the Vestry and Finance Committee include St. Andrew's investment income in our operating budget to make up for shortfalls between revenue and costs. As investment income is never guaranteed, it is important to recognize that St. Andrew's financial health (and therefore our ministries' health) could be improved if the Annual Campaign pledge revenue was more in line with our operating costs.

To this end, we request that everyone prayerfully consider increasing their giving as much as they are able. A 5% increase is the suggested amount. But, as in all earlier Annual Campaigns, we also strive to attain the goal of expanded participation. This is a critical element to put our annual finances on a more sustainable path.

We have much to be thankful for and to celebrate. We have a vibrant spiritual home in St. Andrew's because of the people who come here and who give of the best of themselves to our life in this place. Your ministry of financial support helps sustain our church building, our dedicated clergy and staff, and all the good that St. Andrew's does through the many different ministries: the eight weekly liturgies that offer distinct worship experiences to a broad range of people, our beautiful music programs, the church school, the Breakfast, the pastoral care ministries for the sick and the homebound, resources to provide aid and counseling for families in crisis, and responding to unjust social and economic policies. Your financial support and commitment, that helps make all of this happen, is personal; it's a private prayer between you and God and it is a ministry that measurably sustains and advances the St. Andrew's community. We thank you for your continued generosity of your time, talents, and treasure.

J2A Pilgrimage: June 2016

A Sacred Journey to Harpers Ferry & Washington DC

The J2A Pilgrimage is a sacred journey for our youth shaped to experience God in a new way; a place outside their normal ordinary lives with the purpose of creating an experience full of opportunity for spiritual growth, discovery and ultimately strengthening their relationship with God.

After four years of study and preparation, the eighth group of J2A pilgrims began their Pilgrimage journey to Harpers Ferry in West Virginia. Nestled between green mountains at the confluence of the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers it offered splendid nature, hallowed ground and a region richly steeped in history spanning America's 200 plus years.

The youth contributed to the elements of their itinerary, including a labor intensive environmental service project for the Appalachian Trail Conservancy, and exploring Antietam National Battlefield as well as other battlefields in this historical area. They also enjoyed a fun day of river rafting and zip-lining through God's abundant and beautiful nature. The final days of the pilgrimage were in Washington D.C. where they visited the National Cathedral, Franciscan Monastery & Catacombs, and the Basilica National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. Eager to learn more about the city, small groups independently explored the monuments on the Mall, the National Archives, and Smithsonian Museum of Natural History.

Staying at hostels with modest accommodations provided an opportunity for the pilgrims to share in the planning and preparation of their daily meals and activities. They were challenged to work as a team, nurture their spirit, search out opportunities for discernment, and grow in respect and care for each other. At the close of each day, group and individual contemplation, reflection, prayer and journaling were part of their evening custom.

Education for Ministry


EfM at St. Andrew's returns Monday, September 12, from 6:30 -9:00 pm in the Lounge and continues to meet weekly throughout the school year.

Why Education for Ministry? In the Outline of Faith in the back of our prayer book, the answer to the question "Who are the ministers of the Church?" is "The ministers of the Church are lay persons, bishops, priests, and deacons" (page 855).

Through reading, study, prayer, and discussion, participants in EfM are encouraged to better understand and take on our role as ministers of the church. Following Paul's advice, we are encouraged to "test everything" (1 Thessalonians 5:21), asking questions like "What do I believe about God? about how God and humans relate? about God's creation?" And, importantly, we ask what we're supposed to do in response to these questions. Even when answers lead to more questions, our reflections leave space for thinking about how to put our understandings to work in our daily lives, at personal, institutional, and global levels.

Education for Ministry is a distance-learning course run by the University of the South, with hundreds of local groups like ours around the country. EfM is a fouryear program, in which participants are asked to commit to one year at a time. In the first year, we read the Hebrew Scriptures; second year the New Testament. Those in the third year study church history, while the fourth year is devoted to contemporary theological choices. In addition, the entire group reads two short books to discuss together (for 2016-7, the texts will be "Transformed Lives: Making Sense of Atonement Today" by Cynthia S.W. Crysdale, and "Care for Creation" by Ilia Delio, Keith Douglas Warner, Pamela Wood).

Coventry Supper

What is a Coventry Supper? During World War II the beautiful cathedral at Coventry, England was nearly destroyed by bombs. The parishioners held evening suppers in their homes as a way of keeping their community together. St. Andrew's has adopted this concept in an effort to have our community get to know each other better. It is a wonderful way to get to know others who are a part of the St. Andrew's family.

Those who sign up will be placed in groups of eight that will gather for potluck suppers during the year. Once the groups are assigned, one person will call the others to arrange the first gathering, host the first supper, and provide the main dish. Everyone brings a dish for the meal. The idea is for each person to host the group during the year. The purpose is fellowship; it is not intended as an occasion to drag out the fine linens and silver!

It is suggested that groups meet at least every four to six weeks. We hope that you will join us. Otherwise, it will be the same folks meeting with those with whom they have already had the chance to meet.

Parish History

The East Window

When the church was built in 1867, there was a raised platform at the east end of the nave at the first pillar. Above the Gothic Arch over the chancel was inscribed "Mine House shall be called House of Prayer for All People" (Isaiah 56:7). The chancel extended about six feet back from the arch with a modest altar. There were three lancet windows in the east wall, similar to the three in the west wall, with a figure of St. Andrew in the center window, a sheaf of wheat in the right window and a bunch of grapes in the left.

When the Reverend Tatlock arrived from Trinity Church on Wall Street in New York, he was determined to have a vested choir of men and boys, which was initiated in 1890. In 1894, the chancel was extended eastward and the Rev. Tatlock communicated with his previous Bishop in New York about obtaining a

stained glass window to replace the triplex windows. He was referred to Charles Booth, an English-trained craftsman who had a studio in New Jersey, and arranged to purchase for \$600 a replica of a window Booth had installed in a church in England.

A pictorial window, the central figure is an Angel seated in the tomb. In the left panel are figures of two women, thought to be Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary, the mother of James. In the right panel, is a figure thought to be the Apostle John or the other woman, Salome. In the distance on the right is the hill, Golgotha, surmounted by three crosses. Below the window is the inscription "He is not here, he has risen."

The window is a memorial to Ebenezer Wells (1815-1882) and his daughter Lilian (1856-1890). Dr. Wells was a physician and vestry-member for many years, twice Mayor of Ann Arbor, and President of the First National Bank. The Wells House on the northeast corner of N.

Division and Ann Street is still standing. Wells Street by Burns Park is named for Ebenezer Wells.
