## John Burhenn Vestry Candidate

Thank you for the opportunity to run for vestry. My wife, Robin Berry, and I became active members of St. Andrews prior to our marriage here in 2002. Neither of us were born into the Episcopal faith but found here a welcoming home while coming from different faith traditions. I was a lapsed member of the United Church of Christ (Congregationalist), and my wife grew up in a large Roman Catholic family. Robin has sung in the Adult Choir for many years as well as serving on the Vestry. Our daughter, Fan, has been active in church school, choirs, and theatrical productions. I've also previously served on the Vestry during the 2008 capital campaign and the rector search process that led Father Alan to us. I have been active on the Organ Committee since its inception and cherish the amazing gifts of music presented at St. Andrews. Finally, I've previously served on the Outreach Committee (now reborn as the Social Justice Committee) where Robin and I produced the Sunday evening Theology on Tap presentations.

As the yard sign in front of our house states "We have work to do." The challenges include finding ways to let voices speak and be listened to from those that were previously muted. Can we find new, deeper, and more inclusive meanings in the traditions that sustain many of us here? As Covid is not done with us, supporting the work of the church leadership and staff, and fostering their connection to us, will be paramount. Finally, as a project manager at an architectural firm implementing large projects at UM and various institutions, I've personally witnessed how climate change is impacting our world. Designing sustainable buildings has been a personal passion of mine for decades. It is time for the

church to take a leadership role in how we address climate change and its unfolding threats and challenges.

One of the joys of worshipping at St. Andrews is being part of a wonderful group of people who care deeply about this church, about each other, and possess tremendous talents. I never cease to be amazed at our fellow worshippers and their life stories. There is little we can't accomplish together.

## Elizabeth Gray Calhoun

I am a 30-year+ employee of the University of Michigan, having worked at the U of M Law Library since 1998.

Previously I earned my M.A. from UM in 1984 and started full-time UM employment in 1988.

Through my university employment I have taken additional professional development training in leadership and “team-member” and I currently serve two other non-profit organizations, the Society for Creative Anachronisms as a calligrapher and Target Archery Marshal; and the University Low-brow Astronomers where I am currently one of four Vice Presidents.

I was accepted into the Episcopal Church in June, 2002, after having attended St. Andrew’s since 1999 or so. Since then I have served as Usher, Lector, Intercessor, and Lay Eucharistic Minister; I became an Acolyte in 2009-2010. I have also served on Altar Guild.

I would like to uphold St. Andrew’s mission by working to allow everyone, in our shared sacramental context, to come to their own enlightenment and “salvation” (or in Hebrew, “yasha,” --“broadening”).

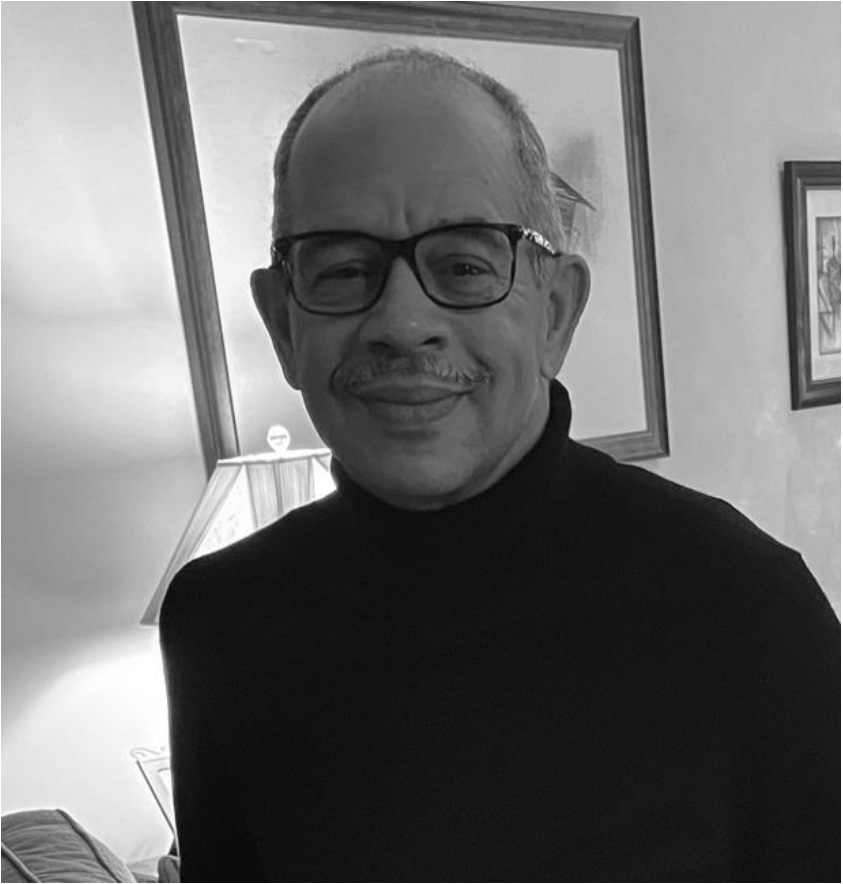
