THE EUCHARIST

The celebration of the Holy Eucharist is an act of joy and praise, which draws its principal meaning from the Easter proclamation of the resurrection. All who are drawn to God and seek Christ are welcome to receive communion.

Wafers will be used for the communion bread. Wine will not be offered. Communion will be distributed at the foot of the chancel steps for those wishing to partake. Ushers will direct you to form a single line down the center aisle as you approach the altar.





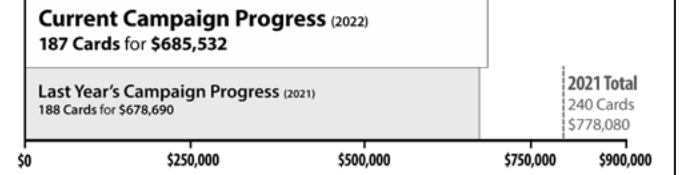
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2022 ANNUAL GIVING CAMPAIGN

Thanksgiving Day Holy Eucharist: 10:00 am in the Church on Thursday, November 25.

O Antiphons: Next Sunday, November 28 at 10:00 am. The Liturgy of the Word for the 10:00 am service on this First Sunday of Advent is shaped by the *O Antiphons*, the texts of which are taken from the monastic antiphons for the *Magnificat* from December 17-24. Set to music by Peter Hallock, these antiphons are interspersed with readings and anthems that respond to each name of the Anointed One to come.

MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 231: By All Your Saints Still Striving Because next week is the first week of Advent we are observing our patron, St. Andrew, today and singing this hymn in his

honor. It has an unusual structure: the first and last verses have unchanging words, but the middle verse changes with each saint's day. The verse for St. Andrew is printed in the left column just below the music. Not only does this hymn celebrate the variety of saints, but it was written by many, too. Horatio Bolton Nelson (nephew of Admiral Nelson) encouraged friends to add verses to his originals, and many did; revisions for *Hymnal 1982* involved many talented hymn writers of our own time. -- Donna Wessel Walker

Hallelujah (Beethoven)
The first major choral work of Ludwig von Beethoven (1770-1827) is the oratorio *Christ on the Mount of Olives*. It is rarely performed in its entirety today. This morning's anthem is the work's final chorus. It has never been relegated to the obscurity of the oratorio itself, though, rivaling even the *Hallelujah Chorus* from Handel's *Messiah* in popularity with choral groups over the years.-- Dennis Powers

TODAY'S SAINT ANDREW'S CROSS

The Saint Andrew's Cross carried in the *Scottish Connexion* today was made by the Allison Family for the 1973 Saint Andrew's Day Program. Shortly after, the family was involved in a tragic automobile accident which claimed the lives of three family members. The St. Andrew's Interecessory Prayer Group was founded in response to the accident.

THE FIRST SCOTTISH CONNEXION

Our Scottish Connexion was developed in 1995 by the Reverend Robert Hart, the Reverend Deacon Svea Gray, Nancy Heusel, and Fran Rounds, to continue the tradition of this church in celebrating the Feast of St. Andrew. ABOUT

Today we are celebrating the Scottish heritage of the American Episcopal Church as well as the heritage and ministry of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Ann Arbor. When we enter the doors of St. Andrew's for worship we join the work started in 1827 by a small group of Episcopalians led by the Reverend Richard F. Cadle of St. Paul's, Detroit.

The presentation of *Our Scottish Connexion* gives us an opportunity to reflect on the courage of our Christian ancestors and the founders of this church, as well as Saint Andrew, Saint Ninian, Saint Margaret, and Samuel Seabury.

SAINC ANDREW, one of the very first to follow Jesus, was martyred on a saltire (X-shaped) cross. Three hundred years later, his relics were brought to Scotland. By the mid-tenth century he was recognized as the Patron Saint of Scotland. His feast is celebrated on November 30.

SAINC NINIAN, an early Roman Christian of the fourth century, became the first Bishop of Scotland and introduced the Christian faith to Scotland. Ninian was also known for his ability to cure illness and perform miracles. His feast is celebrated on September 16.

SAINC MARGAREC, who was the Queen of Scotland, is another of Scotland's Patron Saints. During her life she was known for her charitable works, personal holiness and fidelity to the Church, and work for religious reform. Her feast is celebrated on November 16.

SAMUEL SEABURY was the first American Episcopal bishop and the second Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, USA. When the London-based Anglican Church refused to consecrate Seabury, he then turned to the Scottish Church, which granted his request. The Feast of the Consecration of Samuel Seabury is celebrated on November 14.

When we process into the world at the end of today's service, we will carry with us the examples of passion, courage, and dedication set by Saint Andrew, Saint Ninian, Saint Margaret, Samuel Seabury, and the early members of our own St. Andrew's Episcopal Church.
