Wafers will be used for the communion bread. An intinction cup will be offered at the direction of the clergy. Communion will be distributed at the foot of the chancel steps for those wishing to partake. Ushers will direct you to form a single line down the center aisle as you approach the altar.

MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 469: There's a Wideness in God's Mercy The simple interweaving lines of melody and accompaniment in this hymn give us a chance to slow down and appreciate the tenderness and compassion of the words. The result is a hauntingly beautiful meditation on God's love for all of us. Calvin Hampton (1938-1984) set the text for the Sisters of St. Helena, an Episcopalian order for women in New York City. Its author, Frederick W. Faber, worked as a parish priest in Birmingham in 19th-century. So both words and music in this quiet hymn were created in the noise and bustle of big-city life: may it calm our busy lives, too. -- Donna Wessel Walker

Salvation Is Created (Chesnokov)

This morning's anthem, composed by Pavel Chesnokov (1877-1943) in 1912 as the fifth of his Ten Communion Hymns. is a quintessential example of the style of Russian Orthodox church music exemplified by Rachmaninoff's All Night Vigil (colloquially known as Vespers). It is scored for six unaccompanied voices. Pride of place is given to the lower voices by pairing the soprano and alto lines with first and second tenors and basses. The lower voices start the piece, which creates a haunting atmosphere. The upper voices then enter an octave higher; the resulting widespread sound across all six parts can only be described as transcendent. Its beauty focuses the listener's mind on the divine. -- Dennis Powers
