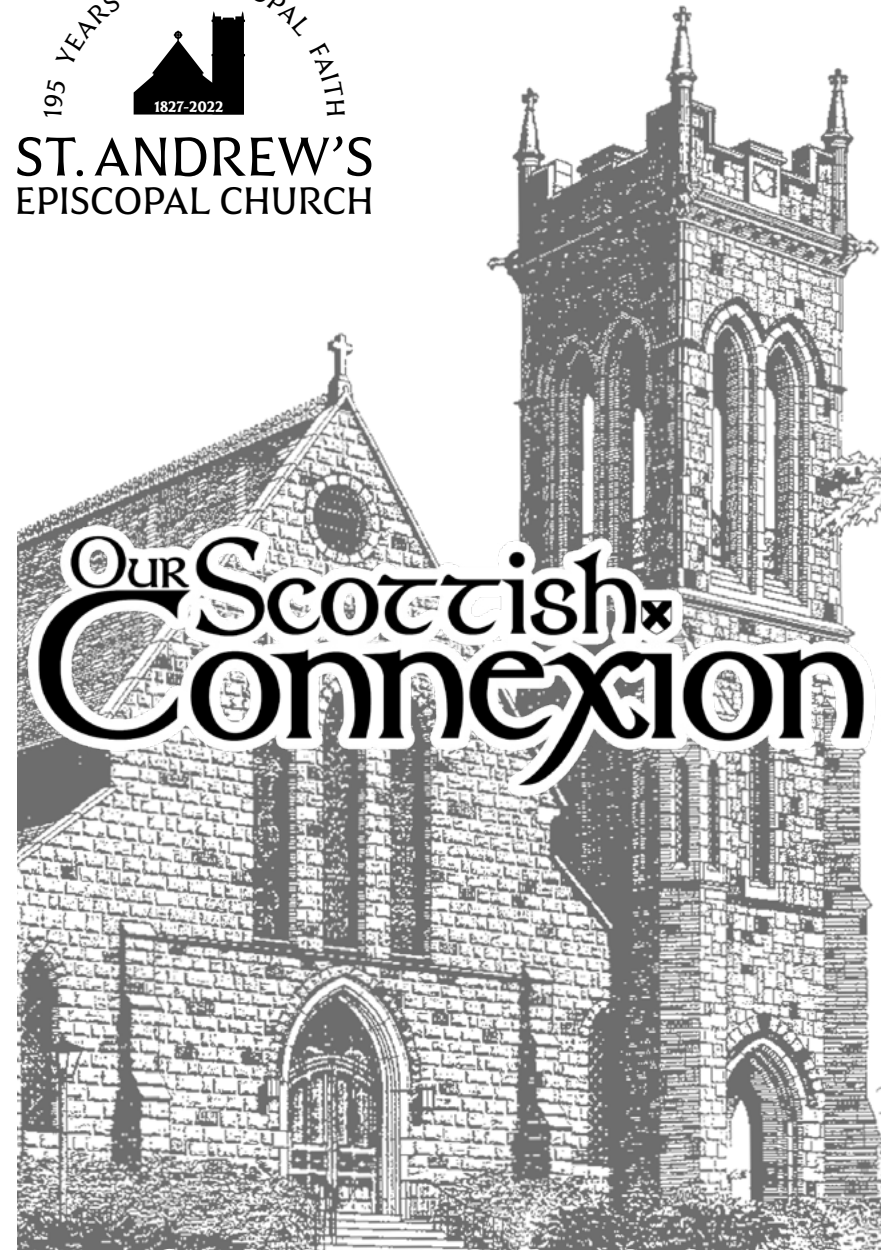
TODAY'S SAINT ANDREW'S CROSS

The Saint Andrew's Cross carried in *Our Scottish ConneXion* today was made by the Allison Family for the 1973 Saint Andrew's Day Program. Shortly after, the family was involved in a tragic automobile accident which claimed the lives of three family members. The St. Andrew's Interecessory Prayer Group was founded in response to the accident.

THE FIRST SCOTTISH CONNEXION

Our Scottish ConneXion was developed in 1995 by the Reverend Robert Hart, the Reverend Deacon Svea Gray, Nancy Heusel, and Fran Rounds, to continue the tradition of this church in celebrating the Feast of St. Andrew. Presentation of this play has become a tradition, giving us all the opportunity to reflect on the passion, courage, and dedication of those who have come before us.

ABOUT

Today we are celebrating the Scottish heritage of the American Episcopal Church as well as the heritage and ministry of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Ann Arbor. When we enter the doors of St. Andrew's for worship we join the work started in 1827 by a small group of Episcopalians led by the Reverend Richard F. Cadle of St. Paul's, Detroit.

The presentation of *Our Scottish ConneXion* gives us an opportunity to reflect on the courage of our Christian ancestors and the founders of this church, as well as Saint Andrew, Saint Ninian, Saint Margaret, and Samuel Seabury.

SAINC ANDREW, one of the very first to follow Jesus, was martyred on a saltire (X-shaped) cross. Three hundred years later, his relics were brought to Scotland. By the mid-tenth century he was recognized as the Patron Saint of Scotland. His feast is celebrated on November 30.

SAINC NINIAN, an early Roman Christian of the fourth century, became the first Bishop of Scotland and introduced the Christian faith to Scotland. Ninian was also known for his ability to cure illness and perform miracles. His feast is celebrated on September 16.

SAINC MARGAREC, who was the Queen of Scotland, is another of Scotland's Patron Saints. During her life she was known for her charitable works, personal holiness and fidelity to the Church, and work for religious reform. Her feast is celebrated on November 16.

SAMUEL SEABURY was the first American Episcopal bishop and the second Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, USA. When the London-based Anglican Church refused to consecrate Seabury, he then turned to the Scottish Church, which granted his request. The Feast of the Consecration of Samuel Seabury is celebrated on November 14.

When we process into the world at the end of today's service, we will carry with us the examples of passion, courage, and dedication set by Saint Andrew, Saint Ninian, Saint Margaret, Samuel Seabury, and the early members of our own St. Andrew's Episcopal Church.

THE EUCHARIST

The celebration of the Holy Eucharist is an act of joy and praise, which draws its principal meaning from the Easter proclamation of the resurrection. All who are drawn to God and seek Christ are welcome to receive communion.

Wafers will be used for the communion bread. An intinction cup will be offered at the direction of the clergy. Communion will be

distributed at the foot of the chancel steps for those wishing to partake. Ushers will direct you to form a single line down the center aisle as you approach the altar.

CHILDREN

A Nursery for infants through toddler age is available during the 10:00 am service, located on the second floor of the Parish Hall.

Children and youth in preschool through high school attend Church School from 9:45 am until they join their families during the Children's Entrance Hymn.

Preschool Families: Please pick up your child in the Morning Glories Preschool class in time for the Children's Entrance Hymn. Our younger ones are not escorted into the sanctuary and **need to be picked up by a parent**, not a sibling.

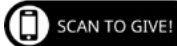

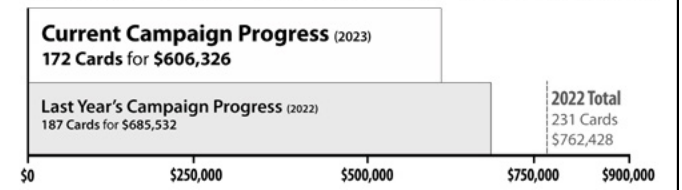

MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 494: Crown him with many crowns
For our patronal feast of St. Andrew, we begin with this spectacular hymn of praise. Like the *Te Deum* this hymn proclaims the many ways we owe praise to Christ: his role in creation; his incarnation and empathy with us; his conquest of death and his gift of life for all; his just rule over all powers and forces; his gathering everything under his "realms of light." The tune, "Diademata" (derived from the Greek word for crown, from which we also get diadem), was written specifically for these words. The close connections between music and meaning lifts our song into true worship. -- *Donna Wessel Walker*

How Lovely Are the Messengers (Mendelssohn) Today's anthem, taken from Part II of the oratorio St. Paul, was a favorite of Queen Victoria's. The oratorio is an integrated scheme of recitatives, arias, and choruses reflecting the classical influence of Bach, Handel, and Haydn. However, Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) also was influenced by the emotional warmth of Romanticism. He employed chorales to heighten and emphasize the religious aura he wanted to convey. This one celebrates the destiny of Paul and Barnabas (and by extension all baptized Christians) to be ambassadors for the Church. -- *Dennis Powers*
