The celebration of the Holy Eucharist is an act of joy and praise, which draws its principal meaning from the Easter proclamation of the resurrection. All who are drawn to God and seek Christ are welcome to receive communion.

Wafers will be used for the communion bread. An intinction cup will be offered at the direction of the clergy. Communion will be distributed at the foot of the chancel steps for those wishing to partake. Ushers will direct you to form a single line down the center aisle as you approach the altar.

In this retelling, two characters are "wounded", in ways that (spoiler alert) turn out to be connected. The healing involves an object that might or might not be the Grail. MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 490: *I want to walk as a child of the Light* Kathleen Thomerson wrote this hymn in 1966 for her home parish, the Church of the Redeemer in Houston, drawing her text from various places in Scripture. The central motif of the refrain, "the Lamb is the light of the City of God" comes from Revelation. When, in verse 3, we anticipate a time when "we have run with patience the race" of life, we are quoting Hebrews 12:1. While the second verse doesn't quote John 9 directly, its plaintive prayer reflects the desire of the man born blind in today's Gospel lesson. -- *Donna Wessel Walker*

Ad Te Levavi Oculos Meos (Palestrina) This morning's anthem sets the Tract from the proper of the Roman Catholic Mass for the Third Sunday in Lent. Tracts are used instead of an Alleluia Verse during penitential seasons when the joyousness of an Alleluia is deemed inappropriate. Their text is series of psalm verses; rarely a complete psalm, but all taken from the same psalm - here Psalm 123. -- *Dennis Powers*
