THE EUCHARIST

The celebration of the Holy Eucharist is an act of joy and praise, which draws its principal meaning from the Easter proclamation of the resurrection. All who are drawn to God and seek Christ are welcome to receive communion.

Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the wafer in the wine in the small cup held by the Eucharistic minister. Alternatively, you may indicate your desire to drink from the common chalice by consuming the bread and remaining at the rail after the Eucharistic minister passes; another Eucharistic minister will bring the large chalice over for you to drink from directly.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

Children and youth in preschool through high school attend Church School from 9:45 am until they join their families during the Children's Entrance Hymn. SJM Welcomes Hilda Alcindor: On Saturday, October 21 at 2:00 pm in the Chapel, the Social Justice Ministry will host Hilda Alcindor, Dean of the Episcopal University of Haiti University Nursing School (FSIL). With support from many Ann Arborites, FSIL became the first baccalaureate nursing school in Haiti, opening its doors to the first class of thirty-six nursing students in January 2005. The nursing school graduated its first class of thirteen men and women in January 2009 and 279 degrees—both undergraduate and graduate - have been awarded since the school's inception (250 Bachelor of Science in Nursing and 29 Family Nurse Practitioner degrees). Dean Alcindor,

herself a nurse, has been FSIL's Dean since the school's inception. She will join St. Andrew's to share FSIL's amazing success story, a story written despite many trials and tribulations over the past two decades.

MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 492: Sing, ye faithful
The words of this hymn echo the movement of this morning's epistle, Philippians 2, which describes Jesus' emptying himself to become a servant, enduring death, to be raised to reign in love over all. This passage itself quotes a hymn that Paul must have heard sung in the community: so with saints reaching back to the first generation of the church we raise this sweetest, and one of our oldest songs. John Ellerton, the author of this text, was a Victorian priest who studied and translated ancient hymns as well as writing his own. -- Donna Wessel Walker
