THE FIRST LESSON 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the LORD had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy."

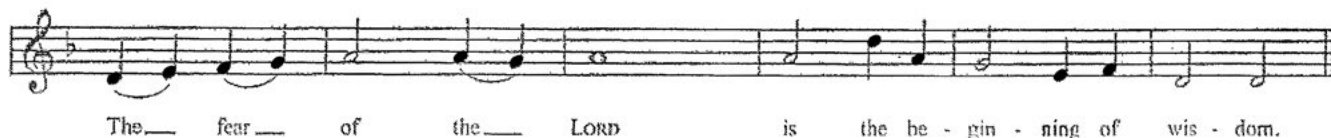
When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

THE SECOND LESSON 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-- that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;
if we endure, we will also reign with him;
if we deny him, he will also deny us;
if we are faithless, he remains faithful--
for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

THE NICENE CREED

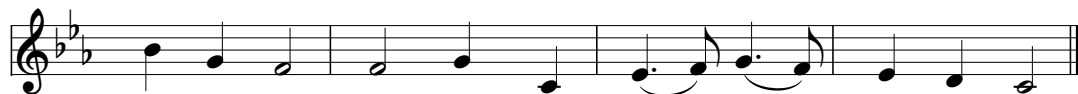

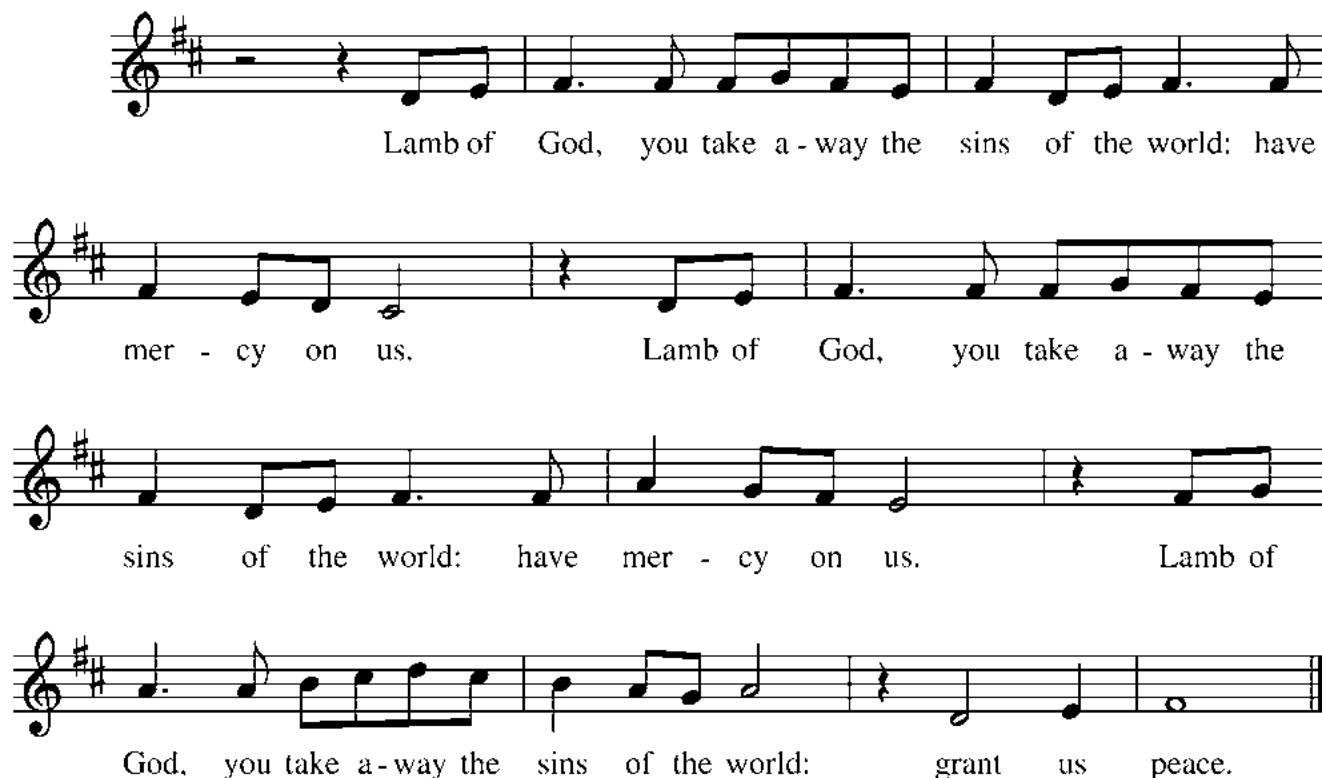

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Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). St. Andrew's Gets Outside Walking Group:

You're invited to take a walk with us every Friday at 8:15 am - meet us at the south entrance of County Farm Park. If you want to leave after one lap of the park, you can still make it to work downtown by 9:00 am! If you want to keep going, we usually finish by 9:30 am. We are flexible, talkative, happy and manage to get in our steps for the day!

Flu Shots: Next Sunday, October 19 from 8:30-11:00 am in the Lounge. Get your flu shot at church - no appointment necessary! Two vaccines will be offered. The "regular" vaccine is for anyone age 9 to 64 (9-17 year olds are required to have parent or guardian present). The "high-dose" vaccine also has four influenza strains, all with a higher antigen dose; this will be given to adults age 65 and above. MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 411: O bless the Lord, my soul!

This hymn text, based on the opening verses of Psalm 103, was part of the development of hymns from psalm-singing in the 18th century: the words are not the exact text of the psalm, but are a looser paraphrase, moving towards the free creation of hymn texts. James Montgomery wrote paraphrases for this and many other psalms, and then went on to write more than 400 hymn texts. The tune also comes from the 18th century; it was paired with many psalms and spread widely in several different versions. Its sprightly movement fits the words' happy recounting of God's blessings. -- Donna Wessel Walker

Missa Brevis: Gloria

The choir sang the *Agnus Dei* from Jonathan Dove's (b. 1959) *Missa Brevis* three weeks ago. It's Gloria is very much a lovely dance with a Stravinskian tinge to its irregular meters. The sparkling organ writing is full of colour. This is immediate, vibrant music that jumps off the page without being self-indulgently theatrical. The thrilling, toccata-like writing for both choir and organ doesn't really let up except, very briefly, at the "Qui tollis" section. -- Dennis Powers
