

Today we are celebrating the Scottish heritage of the American Episcopal Church as well as the heritage and ministry of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Ann Arbor. When we enter the doors of St. Andrew's for worship we join the work started 198 years ago by a small group of Episcopalians led by the Rev. Richard F. Cadle of St. Paul's, Detroit.

## **NOTES**

The presentation of *Our Scottish ConneXion* gives us an opportunity to reflect on the courage of our Christian ancestors and the founders of this church, as well as St. Andrew, St. Ninian, St. Margaret, and Samuel Seabury.

**St. Andrew**, one of the very first to follow Jesus, was martyred on a saltire (X-shaped) cross. Three hundred years later, his relics were brought to Scotland. By the mid-tenth century he was recognized as the Patron Saint of Scotland. His feast is celebrated on November 30.

**St. Ninian**, an early Roman Christian of the fourth century, became the first Bishop of Scotland and introduced the Christian faith to Scotland. Ninian was also known for his ability to cure illness and perform miracles. His feast is celebrated on September 16.

**St. Margaret**, who was the Queen of Scotland, is another of Scotland's Patron Saints. During her life she was known for her charitable works, personal holiness and fidelity to the Church, and work for religious reform. Her feast is celebrated on November 16.

**Samuel Seabury** was the first American Episcopal bishop and the second Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, USA. When the London-based Anglican Church refused to consecrate Seabury, he then turned to the Scottish Church, which granted his request. The Feast of the Consecration of Samuel Seabury is celebrated on November 14.

When we process into the world at the end of today's service, we will carry with us the examples of passion, courage, and dedication set by St. Andrew, St. Ninian, St. Margaret, and Samuel Seabury, and the early members of our own St. Andrew's Episcopal Church.

Celebrant Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support this person

in her life in Christ?

People We will.

Celebrant Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our

own baptismal covenant. Do you believe in God the Father?

People I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Celebrant Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the

> power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and

the dead.

*Celebrant* Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of

saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life

everlasting.

Celebrant Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of

bread, and in the prayers?

People I will, with God's help.

Celebrant Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and

return to the Lord? I will, with God's help.

Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

I will, with God's help.

Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?

I will, with God's help.

Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity

of every human being? I will, with God's help.

Celebrant We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved

> in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into

everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior.


As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray,

> Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the bread in the wine in the small cup held by the first Eucharistic minister, or drink from the large chalice held by the second Eucharistic minister.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

Academy of Early Music Concert: Ground & Fire Saturday, November 15 at St. Andrew's. 6:45 pm talk, 7:30 pm concert. On the Fly: Variations & *Improvisation* • The art of improvising over a structured musical framework is an ancient one. By the early Baroque, this pairing of constancy and fantasy had evolved to include rich, often spectacularly virtuosic variations, some written down and some played ex tempore. #### Music Notes -

#### Hymn 413: New songs of Celebration

This is a paraphrase of Psalm 98, made in 1972 for an ecumenical hymnal of the World Council of Churches, Cantate Domino. It is a fresh and vivid rendering of praise to God from all of creation, in which we are privileged to join. Erik Routley, who wrote this dynamic version, was perhaps the most influential leader of the revival in hymn writing in the second half of the twentieth century, the "hymn explosion." Born and educated in England, Dr. Routley came to teach at Princeton Theological Seminary and the Westminster Choir College in 1975. The tune is, appropriately, from the Geneva Psalter. -- Donna Wessel Walker
