





#### **THE SECOND LESSON** Romans 10:8b-18

"The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart"

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is LORD and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same LORD is LORD of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved."

But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" But not all have obeyed the good news; for Isaiah says, "LORD, who has believed our message?" So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ.

But I ask, have they not heard? Indeed they have; for "Their voice has gone out to all the earth, and their words to the ends of the world."

THE SERMON The Rev. Paul Frolick

#### THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

God of invitation and anointing, you called Andrew and Peter from their nets to a life of ministry and service. Bless this congregation of St. Andrew's. Ground us in community and help us grow in grace. Make us faithful in our witness, generous in our service, and courageous in our discipleship. **God of** glory, hear our prayer.

God of healing and wholeness, be present to the sick, the lonely, the grieving, and all who seek your healing. We remember especially those on our prayer list and those whose suffering is known to you alone. *Pause* Strengthen caregivers and all who minister to those in need. God of glory, hear our prayer.

God of hope and trust, we remember those who have died and now rest in your eternal presence, remembering especially Roberta S. Schwandt and Barbara Becker, in whose memory the flowers are given this morning, and all those we love but see no longer. *Silence* Give to the departed eternal rest. **Let light perpetual shine upon them.** 

God of holiness and integrity, you called your apostle Andrew to proclaim the Gospel and to draw others into the way of Christ. Give us grace to follow his example in faith and obedience, that your Word may take root and bear fruit in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



> Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

> He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.** 


As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray,

> Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the bread in the wine in the small cup held by the first Eucharistic minister, or drink from the large chalice held by the second Eucharistic minister.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

## Hymn 460: Alleluia! sing to Jesus!

This a glorious hymn, with its soaring Welsh tune and exuberant words of praise, is fitting for rejoicing on St. Andrew's day. The text, based on Scripture, gives full expression to our joy in Christ's reign; the tune's name means "joyful." William Chatterton Dix (1837-98), the text's



author, was a marine insurance agent in Glasgow; he also wrote "What Child is This?" The tune was written in 1830 by a young Welshman barely in his 20's; we know very little about Rowland Hugh (or Huw) Prichard except that his grandfather was a bard and that he was a loom-tender's assistant. -- Donna Wessel Walker
