THE FIRST LESSON *Isaiah 49:1-7*

Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples from far away! The LORD called me before I was born, while I was in my mother's womb he named me. He made my mouth like a sharp sword, in the shadow of his hand he hid me; he made me a polished arrow, in his quiver he hid me away. And he said to me, "You are my servant, Israel, in whom I will be glorified." But I said, "I have labored in vain, I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity; yet surely my cause is with the LORD, and my reward with my God."

The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in

the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE *Please stand or kneel.*

Called by God and drawn to follow Jesus, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world, let us pray for the Church, the world, and all in need. *A brief silence* God of light, we give you thanks that you have known us and called us by name, setting our feet upon the path of life. We thank you for the light of Christ revealed among us, and for the joy of discovering again and again that we are invited to come and see. Shape our gratitude into faithful witness, that our lives may point beyond ourselves to your saving love.

People

God of justice and mercy, hear our prayer.

God of faithfulness, we give you thanks for your servant The Rev. David Pumphrey who this week celebrated the 70th anniversary of his ordination to

the priesthood. We bless you for his years of ministry in Word and Sacrament, for the lives he has touched, the prayers he has offered, and the love of Christ he has shared. Grant him continued joy, peace, and the assurance that his labor in you has borne lasting fruit. **God of justice and mercy, hear our prayer.**

God of reconciliation, we pray for a world torn by violence, racism, and division. Heal communities wounded by hatred and gun violence, especially in our own nation. Give us grace to reject indifference and despair, and to work for what Dr. King called “the beloved community,” where love casts out fear and all are valued as your children. **God of justice and mercy, hear our prayer.**

God of creation, whose glory is revealed in all that you have made, teach us to care for the earth with reverence and restraint. Heal lands and waters damaged by human neglect, and guide us to live as faithful stewards, mindful that the earth reflects your goodness and sustains all life. **God of justice and mercy, hear our prayer.**

God of compassion, draw near to all who suffer in body, mind, or spirit: the sick, the grieving, the lonely, and the afraid. Uphold those on our prayer list and those whose needs are known to you alone. *Pause* Strengthen caregivers and all who walk alongside those in pain. **God of justice and mercy, hear our prayer.**

God of promise, we commend to your care those who have died and now rest in your peace. *Silence* Bring them, with all the saints, into the fullness of your light and presence, and give us comfort and hope until we meet again in you. **God of justice and mercy, hear our prayer.**

God of grace, you call us into fellowship with your Son and send us to bear his light into the world. Hear the prayers we offer this day, and strengthen us to follow Jesus with courage, humility, and love; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 7: *Christ, whose glory fills the skies*

This lovely morning hymn suits this season well, for in Epiphany we have of the star in the East, the light shining upon all nations, and Christ being called the “brightest and best of the stars of the morning” in a famous Epiphany hymn. Charles Wesley published the words in 1740; they became very popular very quickly. As early as 1859 the novelist George Eliot pictured a country carpenter, Adam Bede, singing this hymn, coincidentally on a snowy Sunday morning in February. This text has been sung with this tune since 1861; it is adapted from a 16th century German hymn.

Lead Kindly Light

This morning's anthem by Arthur Sullivan (1842-1900), published in 1871 as part of *Five Sacred Part Songs*, sets the familiar hymn text by John Henry Newman. The part song enjoyed great popularity in England in the nineteenth century. Its form was clearly defined: the melody lay in the top line, with the other voices providing the accompaniment.
