THE FIRST LESSON *Isaiah 58:1-9a*

Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgments, they delight to draw near to God. “Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?” Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the LORD?

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.

THE SECOND LESSON *1 Corinthians 2:1-12*

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written,

"What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him"— these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Called to be salt for the earth and light for the world, let us pray for the Church, the world, and all who long for God’s justice and mercy. *A brief silence*
God of light and truth, we give you thanks that you have called us out of darkness into the brightness of your presence. We thank you for the wisdom of your Word, for the gift of your Spirit, and for the ways your light shines through acts of love, mercy, and faithfulness. Make us grateful stewards of these gifts, that our lives may reflect your glory.

People **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of holiness and wisdom, strengthen your Church to live with integrity and compassion. Guard us from empty words or hollow piety, and lead us into lives that bear fruit in justice, mercy, and humility. May our worship and our work together give glory to your name. **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of justice and righteousness, guide the leaders of the nations and all in authority. Give them wisdom to loose the bonds of injustice, to defend the poor and the vulnerable, and to seek the common good. We pray especially for places where violence and fear persist, including Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, and all regions yearning for peace. **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of mercy and compassion, open our eyes to those who hunger, who are without shelter, or who are burdened by loneliness or despair. Strengthen all who labor to feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, and restore dignity to those who have been pushed aside. Make us attentive and generous neighbors. **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of creation and renewal, whose light shines through all that you have made, renew the face of the earth. Heal lands and waters damaged by neglect and greed, and guide us to live gently and wisely, that your creation may flourish and reflect your goodness. **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of healing and wholeness, draw near to all who are sick, grieving, or afraid. Uphold those on our parish prayer list, those whose suffering is known to you alone, and those we name in our hearts. *Pause* Let your light rise in their darkness, and restore them in hope and peace. **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of eternity and grace, we remember those who have died and now rest in your peace, remembering especially Jack van der Velde, in whose memory the flowers are given this week, and all those we love but see no longer. *Silence* Bring them, with all the saints, into the joy of your presence, and strengthen us in the hope of the resurrection. **God of grace, hear our prayer.**

God of faith and hope, you have called us to be salt and light in the world you love. Hear the prayers we offer this day, and by your Spirit make our lives signs of your justice, mercy, and truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

MUSIC NOTES

LEVAS 221: *This little light of mine*

We think of this sprightly song as a Sunday school favorite, and so it functioned in the mid-20th century, after being arranged and published in the 1940s by Harry Dixon Loes. But the song had been sung widely in the Black community before then; it was collected by John Lomax in the early 1930s. Later, it became an anthem of the civil rights movement, adding verses and new tunes along the way. That activist tradition continues, including protests in Baltimore in 2015 and in Charlottesville in August 2017. Small but mighty, this little song still shines. -- Donna Wessel Walker

My Lord What a Mornin'

Harry T. Burleigh (1866-1949) made black music available to classically trained artists both by introducing them to spirituals and by arranging spirituals in a more classical form. In 1892, he was accepted to study at the National Conservatory of Music in New York City. His excellent baritone attracted the attention of the Czech composer Antonin Dvorak, the Conservatory's Director. "I sang our Negro songs for him very often," Burleigh later reminisced, "and before he wrote his own themes, he filled himself with the spirit of the old Spirituals." Dvorak himself later acknowledged that, "[i]n the negro melodies of America, I discover[ed] all that is needed for a great and noble school of music." The closing flute theme of the first movement of Dvorak's Ninth Symphony, colloquially known as the New World Symphony, for example, is remarkably similar to *Swing Low Sweet Chariot*. -- Dennis Powers
