THE SECOND LESSON *Romans 6:12-23*

Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE *Please stand or kneel.*

Leader Sisters and brothers, let us bring our prayers before God, whose love is established forever, and whose faithfulness is proclaimed from age to age. *A brief silence* You are the singer of an ancient song, who has made promises and kept them across centuries of human forgetfulness. We give you thanks for this congregation gathered in your name, for the teachers and prophets who have formed us, and for all who have shown us what it means to walk in the light of your presence.

People **From age to age, we proclaim your faithfulness.**

You are the one who sends. You have called your Church into the world as bearers of your welcome: to the stranger, to the suffering, to the outsider waiting at the edge. Sustain all who serve in your name: those who preach, those who teach, those who visit the lonely, those who work in places of conflict and need. Give to the whole Church courage to offer welcome where welcome is costly. **From age to age, we proclaim your faithfulness.**

You are the giver of true peace. You have taught us that the word of peace must be tested, that easy reassurance is not always your voice, and that faithful speech sometimes names what is hard. Grant wisdom and integrity to those who govern: to the leaders of this nation and all nations, to those who shape policy that touches the vulnerable. May they seek not the peace that flatters but the peace that endures. **From age to age, we proclaim your faithfulness.**

You are the one who provides. You have set us free from slavery to lesser things and called us to present ourselves as instruments of righteousness. Deepen our life together in this community: in our ministries, our giving, our learning, and our care for one another. As we leave this place, make us attentive to the little ones in our daily path and ready to offer whatever we have. **From age to age, we proclaim your faithfulness.**

You are the source of healing and wholeness. We bring before you those who are sick, those who are grieving, and those who cry out with the psalmist: *How long, O Lord?* We pray especially for those on our prayer list and those whose suffering is known to you alone. *Pause* Hear the prayers of all who call upon you, and give light to their eyes. **From age to age, we proclaim your faithfulness.**

You are the keeper of eternal life. We hold before you those who have died, remembering especially Dan Berry, who died this week; The Rev. John T. Franey and Leo Lighthammer, in whose memory the flowers are given this morning; and all those we love but see no longer. *Silence* Trusting in your promise that none who are given into your hands will be lost, we give thanks for all the righteous whose welcome of others has left its mark upon us. **From age to age, we proclaim your faithfulness.**

You are our foundation and cornerstone. Accept and fulfill our petitions, we pray, not as we ask in our ignorance, nor as we deserve in our sinfulness, but as you know and love us in your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Celebrant We pray to you also for the forgiveness of our sins. *Silence*

People **Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; in your compassion forgive us our sins, known and unknown, things done and left undone; and so uphold us by your Spirit that we may live and serve you in newness of life, to the honor and glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.**

Celebrant Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

Celebrant Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

People **Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come again.**

Celebrant We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

All **Amen.**

Celebrant As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray,
All **Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your Name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the bread in the wine in the small cup held by the first Eucharistic minister, or drink from the large chalice held by the second Eucharistic minister.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

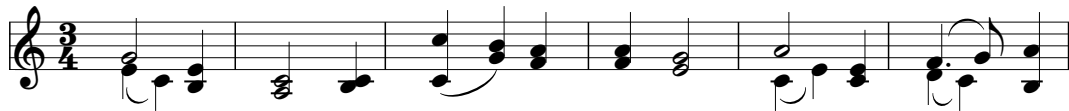
