Theology in Current Events

Theologically Speaking: “Just War”

I look out the window today, and I’m conflicted. On one hand, it’s a beautiful day. The sun is out, the days are getting longer, both my wife and I are reasonably healthy, safe and warm. I feel fulfilled in what I’m doing with my time, and I even get to have a little fun while I’m doing it. In my immediate sphere of influence, things are pretty good, and I am grateful to God that this is the case. However, I also know that this is not the case everywhere. As I write this, war is raging in Ukraine, and I’m confronted with the idea that I’m living through another historical moment that has profound implications, and I’ve been here before.

I was born in Portsmouth Virginia at the naval hospital. My father was a career marine, and at the time, was between deployments to Vietnam. I tell you this because I want you to understand that I am a product of the Cold War, and my own tangential association with the military also contributes to how I see the world. While I would never go so far as to say that the world I grew up in was simple, there were some things that, living in metro Detroit suburbia, I took for granted. The first thing that every person my age and older knew was that the Soviet Union were the bad guys. No discussion, no debate, no nuance. In the books I read, the movies I saw, especially in the jingoistic era of the 1980s, if there was a villain, and they were foreign, you could bet money that they were Russian, or some reasonable stand in. Part of this zeitgeist also told me that, cast as perennial ‘good guys’, America’s military not only *could* go anywhere in the world but *should*, because we weren’t invaders... we were liberators. We weren’t aggressors... we were defenders. We were right, and so, whenever we mobilized our military, it was for the right reasons. That’s the default I grew up with. Especially when it came to foreign policy questions, America had the answer, and if using force was decided on, well, that was regrettable, but necessary.

For years, I, and probably most of you, lived with the tension of the Cold War with the Soviet Union, and the uneasy detente that developed through the 60s and 70s. Honestly, that’s how I thought things were always going to be, until 1989, when the Berlin Wall fell. That’s the first time in my life I remember thinking that I was a witness to history; that there was definitive before that moment, and after. From this point on, everything would be different... and it would be.

I graduated from high school in 1990, and I was at EMU in 1991 when I saw my first protest march. A group of students were marching and chanting in support of Operation: Desert Storm. Across the parking lot to my dorm, there was a smaller, but just as determined band of counter-protesters who were against violent foreign intervention, and what they saw as a “war for oil”. This was my first inkling of what the world would be like. The clear boundaries that I’d grown up with were gone, and I was uncomfortable with the endless shades of gray that I was suddenly confronted with.

On one hand, I wanted to be supportive of the military, and the job they were being asked to do. Though my father had retired from the Marine Corps, there were people that I knew who would be in harm’s way, and I of course wanted them to return home safe and sound. Still, the rationale for the first invasion of Iraq was complex, and the ramifications would be far-reaching.

I’ll leave aside for a moment the problematic idea that, in the 1990’s, America’s military interventions had t-shirts and branding consultants...

I have watched now, since the end of February as the Russian military has invaded Ukraine. My first reaction was something akin to “We (The United States) need to respond to this!” My knee-jerk reaction was for military intervention. If this were 1938, I would say that was an option, but there are many reasons why that’s not a viable answer as far as I’m concerned. As a committed follower of Christ, I’m also leery of meeting violence with violence. There is the tension there. Between wanting the issue to be solved out of genuine empathy and grief for the people of Ukraine, but also knowing that no matter how just a war might seem, it’s still rooted in righteousness through force. And that’s unsettling. Those of you with a historical or theological background may be familiar with St. Augustine of Hippo’s writing on the concept of a Just War.

You can find a PDF of those writings here: <https://www.gcsnc.com/cms/lib/NC01910393/Centricity/Domain/5418/Just-War%20Theory.pdf> There are several criteria that Augustine lays out, all of which seem reasonable:

1 – War must be a last resort

Augustine, I think rightly, points out that all avenues of diplomacy and other peaceful solutions should be explored before war is declared.



2 – Legitimate Authority

A war can only be declared by a duly appointed government.

3 – Just Cause

This is a serious point of debate. It also assumes that everyone can agree on what is just.

4 – Probability of Success

No one goes to war assuming that they will not win, but it is also an important decision point. In Augustine's time, a nation going to war meant a significant loss of life and resources, even if one were to win. Today, the costs may not be as all consuming, but the ramifications of going to war and losing are daunting to say the least.

5 – Right Intentions

This, to me is the most problematic point. War is inherently chaotic. Even when things go as well as they possibly could, things go wrong. People die, and lives are irrecoverably changed. Intent is important. Intent is the basis of everything we do, but meaning well and doing right are not always the same thing.

This is a simplified list of Augustine's criteria, but it's important to note that, just as we might find ourselves wrestling over our own response to the war in Ukraine, I bring it up here, not to advocate a specific position, or to claim that one side is more right than the other, but to show that even the most learned, prayerful, or powerful among us has wrestled with the moral, ethical, and spiritual ramifications of war for thousands of years. I don't know that I can provide an answer that even I am happy with, and I certainly would not presume to offer one for someone else.

The only thing I can offer is that prayer and honest reflection will lead you to a place where you can hear the Holy Spirit speak. As I said to someone on social media, after sharing the Archbishop of Canterbury's prayer for Ukraine: Prayer is the first act. Not the last. ✕


Big Provincial Gathering

Church School Happenings

Church School for Children

During spring lessons early, primary, and intermediate learners reflect on the events of Holy Week with a special lesson hosted by the “Middies” Rite 13 Youth Group. The children will explore several interactive stations and the journey to the cross with stories and activities.

The Easter Story rejoicing in the life and resurrection of Jesus follows in Eastertide with His appearance to the disciples, their commissioning, and Jesus’ Ascension. God’s gift of the Holy Spirit brings full circle the birth of the Church and our faith community. Tales from the Journey


During Lent, our middies youth group will explore the timely theme of ways we connect with God and resources for spiritual guidance. They are taking a deep dive into the meaning of the “Lord's Prayer” by creating their own version. The class will host the younger children with a special interactive “Experiencing Holy Week” event on Palm Sunday. The theme for the Eastertide liturgical season is *The Tree of Life* that explores what scripture tells us about God's desire for us; God's dreams for us, how we are empowered to choose, and fulfilling a nurturing and life-giving spiritual path. The closing theme for the Rite 13 lessons is *What Does the Lord Require*, which looks at justice and how God wants us to live. This culminates with two events; helping with the CS Baby Shower service project and celebration for the Hope Clinic (May) and in early summer we plan to do an “Urban Outing” to visit St. Paul's Cathedral, Eastern Market and the Heidelberg Project.

It was "supper and a show", with supper being a fundraising opportunity for the youth toward Pilgrimage. Several years before the pandemic, the Sunday performance had been moved to right after church, with lunch interpreted as "supper" to fortify the audience. Since we are not likely going to be able to do that this year, it makes sense to move the performance to later in the afternoon.



One way to make this a good fundraiser that I am contemplating is to move the ticket sales online, using a platform similar to that used in our virtual production of *Spoon River Anthology* in 2021. A great deal of generosity was shown in donations toward Pilgrimage and I would like to offer that opportunity again. However the details are worked out, I am hoping for similar generosity: our youth need our financial support, since the usual fundraising models broke down.

The Players had a lot of fun last summer on Zoom, reading *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* and *Arsenic and Old Lace*, with lots of shuffling of parts. It became a sort of actor's workshop. I am hoping to do more readings this summer, either on Zoom or in person. ✂
