## “The Work of Christmas”

When the song of the angels is stilled,  
When the star in the sky is gone,  
When the kings and the princes are home,  
When the shepherds are back with their flocks,  
The work of Christmas begins:  
To find the lost,  
To heal the broken,  
To feed the hungry,  
To release the prisoner,  
To rebuild the nations,  
To bring peace among people,  
To make music in the heart.

Howard Thurman (1899-1981)

Philosopher, theologian, educator, and civil rights leader, Howard Thurman published this poem in 1973 in a collection entitled, “The Mood of Christmas.” Like most years, 1973 had its highs and lows: the thawing of U.S. relations with China, the Vietnam War ends, the Watergate scandal escalates, Skylab is launched, the Yom Kippur War, to name a few significant events. As we approach Christmas and the end of 2021 with the hopes of the return of

many traditions and rituals we missed last year, we can anticipate some uplifting moments in what has been a challenging year. Yet it is important that our celebrations don't overtake the reason why we are celebrating. The gift of God's son to us is about more than extended family gatherings and feasting. The Christ child came to us to offer himself to a world that needs healing and hope. As we mark a second Christmas in this pandemic, those needs are perhaps more clear than they have ever been. In 1973, Thurman saw them very clearly and spelled out what needed and still needs to be done.

We all want to return to some sense of normalcy, but I hope none of us will be satisfied with what feels like more or less a regular Christmas and thinks that's all that needs to happen. The child born in Bethlehem still offers himself to a world that needs so much. Will this Christmas be the one that we help him do what he came to do? Will this be the year we commit to the real meaning of Christmas? If it is, and if we do, that would be a gift unlike any the world has ever received.

## Church School for Children

Faith at Home materials are provided for families and follow the lectionary while thematic lessons are shared in our Sunday Church School classes. During Advent, children once again hear stories from the prophets as we await the coming of the Messiah. We'll celebrate Epiphany and the Baptism of our Lord with special lessons in each classroom. Stories of Jesus' healing miracles and many parables guide us through the early winter months.

**Worship & Wonder** early childhood learners hear stories from the prophets as we await the coming of the Messiah and rejoice in the mystery of Christmas. In the season of Epiphany, children hear about the Baptism of our Lord, stories of Jesus in the wilderness, and the parables of the mustard seed and great pearl.

**Primary** lessons help learners know Jesus as a real person, calling us to enter into a relationship with him. Jesus is perceived to be fully human from the moment of his birth, living and active in our lives now. Yet he is different from all others. He is Christ the Messiah that has come into the world for ALL people. We'll focus on stories surrounding his birth, Elizabeth and Zechariah, John the Baptist, the Christmas Story and Epiphany.

**Intermediate** learners will be looking at New Testament passages and themes. Jesus was sent from God as our Messiah and Savior. In him, God made a New Covenant with humankind. We'll hear stories of the prophets' visions fulfilled, which are found in the prophecies of Jeremiah, Micah and Ezekiel, Isaiah's vision of salvation, Gabriel's announcement and Mary's Song, the Magnificat.



## Tales from the Journey

The 7th, 8th and 9th grade class have been busy with an art fair parking fundraiser, two community outreach walks, a fun corn maze/cider outing, holiday pie sales and reflection and preparation for their Rite 13 Ceremony. Fondly known as the "middies" the Rite 13 Ceremony recognizes these young people as they take their first steps towards adulthood. They'll explore new ideas and their pondering questions of faith in both fun and serious activities. In addition to lessons and Gospel reflection, they are creating strong bonds of friendship and are active in the worship service and other ministries. All of this is balanced in concert with affirmations that remind our young people they do have a voice and we are listening.

The high school class of 10th, 11th and 12th grades will explore the scriptures with a variety of approaches such as artistic response, journaling, meditative and other methods beyond a theological approach. These young adults are looking to engage in more profound ways that transcend the words and message of the scriptures into their everyday lives. This is a particularly important time as they embrace the full depth and breadth of their emerging adult responsibilities especially when contemplating their post-high school plans. They have very full lives, and the forums hopefully provide an opportunity for the young adults to share stories, sound off and stay grounded in their physical, mental, emotional and spiritual well-being. Eric Braun, seminary intern, has joined the team along with Steve Hastings as mentors for the group. In January we'll begin a series of forums leading to confirmation preparation and discernment. The class will also finalize plans for their postponed pilgrimage now on the horizon for June 2022.

We are thankful for our families, friends and parishioners for your prayers and encouragement in this challenging year. May you continue to feel the presence of God in your life especially during this beautiful season of Advent and enjoy an abundance of blessings in the New Year. ✝

With a little luck we may be able to hear at least a portion of the new organ by Christmas, so Christmas Eve will be truly festive. Please give some thought to the participation of your children (and yourself!). We will begin with a Zoom organizational meeting and read-through on Sunday, November 28 at 1:00 pm. After that, rehearsals will be on Saturdays, 10:30 am—12:00 pm, in the Sanctuary. The dress rehearsal will be on Wednesday, December 22, with a Christmas Eve performance on Friday, December 24. With children being vaccinated, the prospects for the spring musical in May are much brighter. We will finally be able to stage *Peter Pan*, which we have waited two years for. 
### A Celebration of African American Composers


