Dear Friends:

In mid-January we lost one of America's most expressive contemporary voices. Mary Oliver, the Pulitzer Prize-winning poet, died after a long and fruitful career at the age of 83. Raised in Ohio, Oliver spent much of her adult life on Cape Cod. Many of her poems draw on her love for and observations of nature. While not formally religious, a deep spirituality rooted in the creation speaks through her words. It's almost impossible for me to pick a "favorite" Mary Oliver poem, but here's one of my favorites.

"The Swan"

Did you too see it, drifting, all night, on the black river?  
Did you see it in the morning, rising into the silvery air—  
an armful of white blossoms,  
a perfect commotion of silk and linen as it leaned  
into the bondage of its wings; a snowbank, a bank of lilies,  
biting the air with its black beak?

Did you hear it, fluting and whistling  
a shrill dark music—like rain pelting the trees—like a waterfall  
knifing down the black ledges?

And did you see it, finally, just under the clouds—  
a white cross  
streaming across the sky, its feet  
like black leaves, its wings  
like the stretched light of the river?

And did you feel it, in your heart, how it pertained to everything?  
And have you too finally figured out what beauty is for?  
And have you changed your life?

### **AED/CPR Classes: March 30**

*Available for the whole Parish!*

This is your opportunity to receive training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) as well as learn how to use an automatic defibrillator (AED). Open to the entire parish, an AED/CPR class will be offered on Saturday, March 30, 8:00 –11:45 am, in the Chapel.

We will receive instruction, practice with manikins, and learn to locate and use the AED machine. There is **NO CHARGE** and *ALL are welcome*: both to learn specific skills and also to learn how to help in an emergency. ### **A New Way to Give!**

If you are 70½ or older and are facing required minimum distributions (RMD) from an IRA, consider making a gift to St. Andrew's through a Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD). A QCD is a withdrawal from an IRA that is sent directly to a charity. A QCD can satisfy a portion or all of your RMD and you may receive certain tax benefits in addition to helping the church. Speak with your financial adviser to learn if this way of giving makes sense for you.

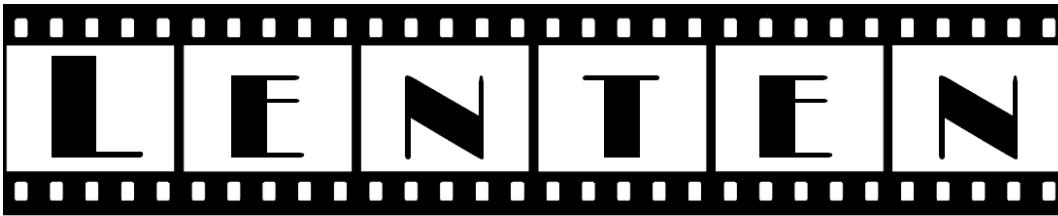

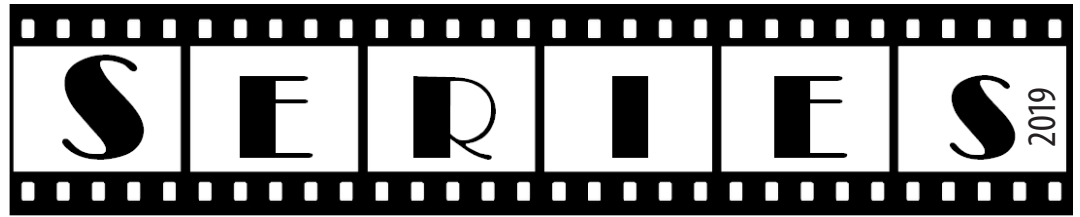

*The popular Dinner and Movie program returns on the Wednesday evenings in Lent!*

This year's selections explore how life sometimes imitates art with films that caught the development of a societal trend before it became "a thing."

The evening begins with Evensong in the Church at 6:00 pm and continues with a pot-luck supper in the Lounge at 6:30 pm. Fr. Alan will make a big pot of vegetarian soup. **Please bring a side dish, salad or dessert to share.** After we have served ourselves we will watch the movie while we eat. Due to the length of some of the films we will begin our viewing promptly at 6:45 pm.

**March 13: *Network***

(R, 121 minutes, drama)

A television network exploits a former news anchor's ravings and revelations about the media for its own profit.

**March 20: *Wag the Dog***

(R, 97 minutes, comic drama)

After being caught in a sex scandal days before the election, the President does not seem to have much of a chance of being re-elected. His advisers contact a top Hollywood producer in order to manufacture an unlikely crisis that the president can heroically end, all through mass media.

**March 27: *The Wave***

(Unrated, 107 minutes, German drama with English subtitles)

A popular high school teacher's experiment to demonstrate to his students what life is like under a dictatorship spins horribly out of control when he forms a closed social unit within his classroom that develops a life of its own.

**April 3: *Children of Men***

(R, 119 minutes, drama)

Set in London in 2027. No child has been born on the planet for 18 years and science is at loss to explain the reason. African and East European societies collapse and their dwindling populations migrate to England and other wealthy nations. A former peace activist turned bureaucrat, Theo, joins forces with his revolutionary ex-wife Julian in order to save humanity by protecting a woman who has mysteriously become pregnant. This film is based on a novel by P.D. James.

**April 10: *Gattaca***

(PG-13, 116 minutes, science fiction drama)

In a future, genetically modified society, an underclass of humans are only useful for menial labor. One such man, Vincent, assumes the identity of Jerome, a perfect genetic specimen who is a paraplegic as a result of a car accident, in order to enter the space program. Just as Vincent is finally scheduled for a mission, his program director is killed and the police begin an investigation, jeopardizing his secret.

# Church School Happenings

## Church School Lessons

For the winter and early spring unit *intermediate students* will explore three major concepts: worship in the sacramental tradition, observance of Lent and the charge to engage in mission, the work God asks us to do in the world. The *primary grades* focus on Worship: People in Community, orders of ministry: laity, bishops, priests and deacons. The youngest group of children, *preschool through first grade*, begin with many wonderful parables, the most important commandment and conclude with the events in Lent and Easter leading to Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension. In January, these grades combined for two highly interactive lessons: Epiphany celebration wearing royalty costumes, crowns and a special parade to follow the Star into the sanctuary. They also heard the story of Jesus' Baptism and had the chance to Baptize baby dolls, complete with all the elements of the sacrament.

## Ash Wednesday: March 6

Each year we have a special Ash Wednesday service for children and families, marking the beginning of Lent. The Junior Choir sings and the Church School volunteers as readers and other roles. The "Alleluia Scroll" created at Carnivale, will be buried in the undercroft of the Church by the children attending the 4:30 pm Ash Wednesday service. This symbolic act reflects the unspoken status of the "alleluia" word during Lent. On Easter Sunday, the Alleluia Scroll will be resurrected, placed in the chapel and with one joyful voice a resounding "Alleluia" returns.

## Outreach Caring & Sharing

*Thank you:* We don't always know the individuals or families that donate with any of the general collections, however, the Advent service project for Orchards Children's Services was especially giving.
