I've shared some poetry of Denise Levertov (1927-1997) in the past. Here's another that I hope will resonate with you.

### For the New Year, 1981

I have a small grain of hope—  
one small crystal that gleams  
clear colors out of transparency.

I need more.

I break off a fragment  
to send you.

Please take  
this grain of a grain of hope  
so that mine won't shrink.

Please share your fragment  
so that yours will grow.

Only so, by division,  
will hope increase,

like a clump of irises, which will cease to flower  
unless you distribute  
the clustered roots, unlikely source—  
clumsy and earth-covered—

of grace.

Though we are now a couple of months into the new year this poem can speak to any time of the year, in any age, particularly ours. If we pay attention only to the relentless news cycle, 2020 has gotten off to a turbulent start that seems to veer from catastrophe to apocalypse. That is not how God ever intended for us to live, and as people of faith we must not give in to the prevalent Siren's call to do so. As many around us retreat into an increasingly isolated existence defined by human-made division we have the opportunity to engage in a healthful type of division by giving of the good that is within each of us to promote the growth of a greater good in the world with all of God's creatures. Such a community of hope engaged with the world, rather than running from it, is what will keep the world from falling into despair and will also give us all an opportunity to flourish. May this upcoming season of Lent and the promise of Easter be a time to give and receive this precious gift.

## Washtenaw Reads 2020

### *Book Discussion at St. Andrew's*

The theme of Washtenaw Reads 2020 is "Everybody Counts" and the book's title is *Dear America: Notes of an Undocumented Citizen* by Jose Antonio Vargas.

The Social Justice Ministry at St. Andrew's will sponsor a discussion of *Dear America* on Sunday, February 2 at 11:30 am in the Chapel. Dr. Deborah Kanter, Chair and John S. Ludington Endowed Professor of History at Albion College, will lead the discussion. Dr. Kanter's area of expertise is Latin American History, particularly the Mexican Diaspora. She's also the author of *Chicago Católico: Making Catholic Parishes Mexican* (University of Illinois Press).

### **White Fragility: A Book Discussion Series**



An important book for everyone who cares about racial justice, *White Fragility* presents a challenging exploration of racism and white privilege in today's America.



*The popular Dinner and Movie program returns on the Wednesday evenings in Lent!*

This year's theme is - *Food*: how it sustains us, it defines families and cultures, it can bring people together or it can separate us from each other. The need for food is one thing all human beings share. It is a commonality through which relationships can be formed that can teach us a great deal about ourselves.

Beginning with Evensong at 6:00 pm, the evening continues with a pot-luck supper in the Lounge at 6:30 pm. (Fr. Alan will make a big pot of vegetarian soup. Please bring a side dish, salad or dessert to share.) After we have served ourselves we will watch the movie while we eat. Due to the length of some of the films we will begin our viewing promptly at 6:45 pm.

### **March 4: *Toast***

(PG-13, 96 minutes, British Biographical Drama)

English chef, Nigel Slater recalls growing up in 1960s England with a mother he loves dearly but whose greatest culinary offering is toast. When she dies, young Nigel is left with a distant father who falls into a relationship with the distasteful Mrs. Potter who turns out to be an excellent cook. A rivalry for the father's affection between Nigel and the new Mrs. Slater then ensues which eventually leads Nigel into the upscale kitchens of London.

### **March 11: *Sweet Bean***

(Unrated, 102 minutes, Japanese Drama with English subtitles)

A young baker stuck in a small snack shop is visited by an elderly woman looking for work making a popular sweet pancake, dorayaki. A taste of her homemade red bean paste convinces him to hire her, which starts a relationship that changes his view on life and the world around him.

### **March 18: *Big Night***

(R, 109 minutes, Drama)

Two immigrant brothers run a failing Italian restaurant in 1950s New Jersey. In a last-ditch effort to save their business they plan an evening of over-the-top food and music for a renowned restaurant critic.

### **March 25: *The Cakemaker***

(Unrated, 113 minutes, German/Israeli Drama with English subtitles)

Thomas, a young German baker, is having an affair with a married Israeli business man who dies in a car crash. Thomas travels to Jerusalem seeking answers about his lover's life. Without revealing his past, Thomas starts working for Anat, his lover's widow, who owns a small café. Although not kosher, his delicious cakes turn the place into a city attraction and Anat begins to move forward with her life. Yet Thomas' secret catches up with him raising new questions for both of them.

### **April 1: *The Hundred Foot Journey***

(PG, 122 minutes, Drama)

When the owner of a Michelin-starred restaurant in the south of France is confronted with an Indian family who opens a restaurant 100 feet from her establishment a culinary war breaks out that leads to an interesting and tasty collision of cultures.

**In the Classroom ...**

During mid-winter and early spring all children explore the New Testament with Jesus' parables, miracles, Baptism and Lent.

Our youngest children, preschool through first grade, are learn many wonderful parables including the mustard seed, the great pearl, and the good Samaritan.

Primary learners explore Jesus as the healer, a living being who we can turn to in prayer, knowing he is always with us.

Intermediate learners explore Jesus' miracles and his great deeds of power accomplished during his early ministry. This age is ready to explore, in greater depth, the sacrament of Baptism. A variety of teaching methods will help intermediate learners understand more about the first sacrament given by Christ to his Church.

This symbolic ritual helps children say goodbye to the Alleluia which is not spoken or sung during Lent. We put the *alleluia* away, like putting away a favorite toy for a while so we appreciate it even more when we bring it back. On Easter Sunday, the Alleluia Scroll will be resurrected from its undercroft tomb and placed in the chapel when we once again sing a joyful praise of *Alleluia*.

**Outreach Caring & Sharing**

## ORGAN UPDATE

We have good news! The new St. Andrew's organ is currently under construction in Tennessee and should be ready for installation and voicing in mid- to late 2021. We appreciate the continued support of those who have made gifts toward this project and donors' patience as things move slowly to completion.

Final design for the renovations necessary to accommodate the new instrument is being worked on by our architects, with anticipated completion by the end of February. Bid and award of a contract for renovations is expected to be in March/April. The existing organ will be removed in early June with work to prepare the space for the new instrument being done over the summer. Throughout the construction period every effort will be made to avoid impacting church or other activities in the sanctuary.
