Dear Friends

The email read, "Welcome to AA!" With that in mind—Hello. My name is Wayne. And I'm a Priest.

By the time you read this, I will have spent my first month getting to know you and Ann Arbor. I'm probably still unpacking what I decide to use during the next year or so, while negotiating my way around town and discovering new sights and sounds along the way.

My first position after ordination was as an Interim Rector. There, some didn't want to accept the whole interim aspect, thinking they should just go ahead and call a new rector and be done with it. Their reality became that circumstances within and without led to their merging with other congregations in the area, and their building was sold to a congregation from a different denomination.

I don't expect that to be the case this time around. St. Andrew's is, at a glance from the outside, a vibrant, thriving congregation eager to get back to a fuller expression of ministry in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Let's take this interim time to discover what that looks and sounds like. None of us expected a pandemic that would define so much of our lives for going on three years. And when that began, it's likely that no one, save perhaps one, imagined that your Rector for more than a decade would retire. There have also been a few political and economic things going on that affect our lives.



One thing, at least, did not change. And it's appropriate that we keep this in mind as we enter this most favored of times in a congregation's life. Stewardship will be a recurring word these next several weeks. Sometimes the foundation of our stewardship gets lost as other details seek our attention. We are stewards of a story, as an old movie named it, "The Greatest Story Ever Told."

During this next year or so, I hope to hear your story about how that "greatest story" is lived among the folks who gather to hear it and celebrate it again as part of the fellowship known as St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Ann Arbor. Then, we'll talk about how we continue to live and tell that story in the reality of the story of pandemics, life changes, political and economic events, and so on. Perhaps some new and different ways to do that will emerge.

Who we are can change as life goes on. But whose we are is the foundation of our faith. We are God's children, adopted through faith, redeemed by the life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. That's the story we have to tell, and do so in as many ways as it takes to help others believe it includes them, too.

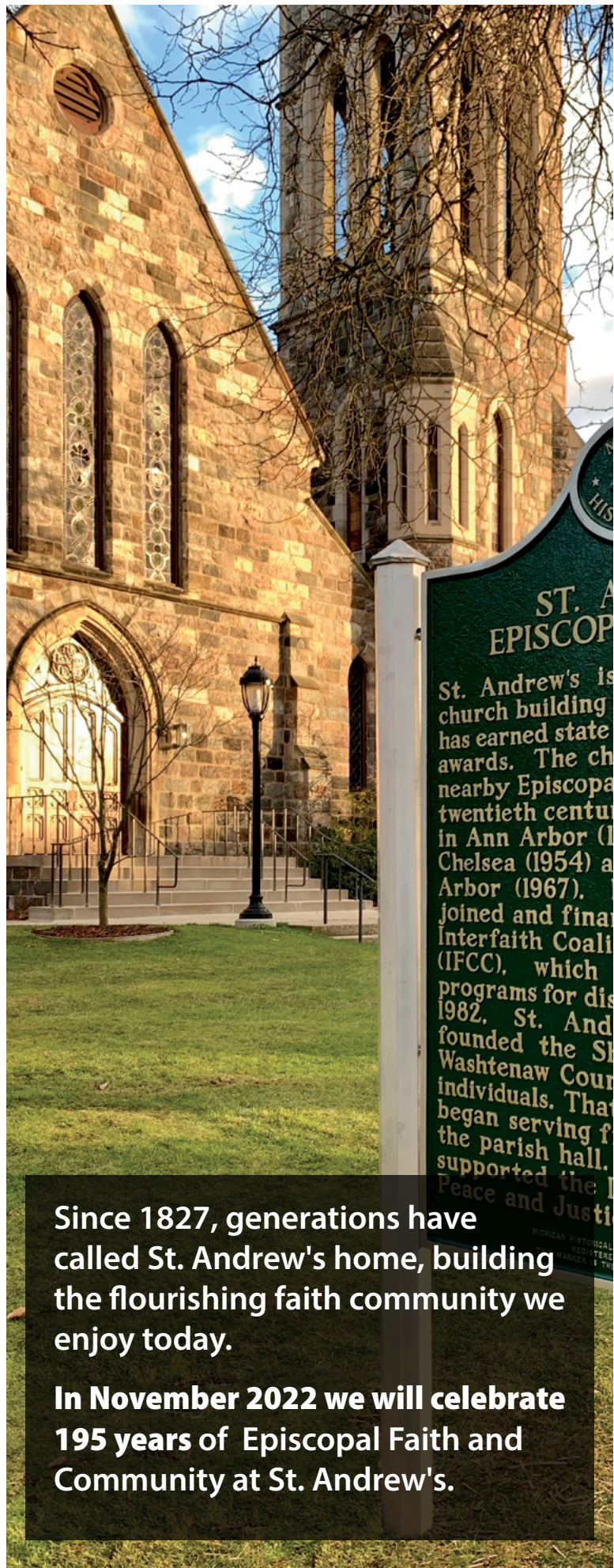

# Transition Update

## Greetings from your Search Committee!

During the summer months, we have been developing ways you can provide input to us as we proceed with the process of searching for our next rector. We have also outlined a schedule described below, milestones for the process.

### We want and need your input!

**From September 11 through September 30, we ask that you participate in the online Church Assessment Tool.** This is an assessment of our parish completed by parish members. This should take about 30 minutes to complete. Members of the committee will be available after services in September, if you have any questions.

**The Diocese believes that the Church Assessment Tool will give us a broad sense of where members of our church think St. Andrew's should head in the future, as well as a description of our church as a unique body of people.** The survey will help us identify your priorities for St. Andrew's as we search for our next rector. All answers will be anonymous. A benefit to the survey is its impartiality, all members of the parish are afforded the opportunity to provide input; whether you are talkative or shy, young or old, a recent member or a longtime member.

**The online Church Assessment Tool is not the only way we seek your input.** You will have the opportunity to attend small group meetings where you can tell the search committee what you think should be a priority in looking for our next rector.

**You can also share your ideas by sending an email to [searchcommittee@standrewsaa.org](mailto:searchcommittee@standrewsaa.org).** Emails will be held in confidence and are accessible only to members of the Search Committee.

Anything we receive will be opened by the Search Committee only and kept confidential.

**Finally, please do not hesitate to talk to one or more members of the Committee.** We are happy to visit with you about the process and we are interested in your thoughts.

### Goals for 2022 and early 2023

The Search Committee, in consultation with the Diocese, has set the following tentative schedule for milestones in the search process. We will always keep you informed of the details along the way.

- **September 11-30, 2022:** We ask that members of the parish complete the online Church Assessment Tool. Opportunities will be available for small group discussions.
- **Early-mid October 2022:** The Search Committee and the Vestry, guided by the clergy of the Diocesan Transition Team, will make the results of the Church Assessment Tool available to the parish.
- **November/December 2022:** We will complete our Parish Profile, which must be approved by the Vestry and the Bishop. The Parish Profile is the description of St. Andrew's that candidates interested in becoming our new Rector will review. It tells our story.
- **January 2023:** The Diocese will post the position and begin to identify candidates to be our next rector. The position is typically posted by the Diocese for 8 weeks.

# Church School Happenings

## Dear Church School Family and Friends,

A new chapter is about to begin for me!

I will be retiring at the end of September from my role as Director of Children and Youth Ministries. I have been so blessed to be a part of St. Andrew's since calling this my church home when Chas I were married here in September 1987.

My time, in our Church School, is full of treasured memories: days of volunteering when my children were young, going on pilgrimage, being a part of the youth program, and experiencing the wonder of children growing into young adults.

It has been a privilege and gift to be entrusted with the care and nurturing of your children's faith journey. It brings endless joy and reward to have travelled together; richly blessed with the bonds of friendship, the connection of community, and the especially cherished time with our children and youth.

As a parish, we should be very proud as well as grateful for the many volunteers, friends and benefactors supporting our collective work in such an important ministry. I truly believe that there is no higher calling than to provide a learning environment that guides children to know God's love.

Our church school and the teaching ministry has continued to evolve and grow over the years. I am grateful to Nancy Heusel, Fr. Alan, the teacher volunteers, and the entire staff who have been more than a source of support, they have been comrades in this mission, and wonderful friends.

I know in my heart; God guided me down this path to this special time in my life. I am certain that this is where I was meant to be. I am so very appreciative for the opportunity to express my faith and energies in



such a meaningful role at St. Andrew's. My family has unconditionally and graciously shared this passage with me, and I am a better person for their love and support.

On June 15, 1868, the cornerstone of St. Andrew's was laid for the "new" church building. A box with special deposits was buried as part of the ceremonies. The Rector at that time, Dr. Gillespie said:

"... as a token that we here erect a church as for ourselves and for our children, and to be a sign and token so as long as these walls shall stand, that St. Andrew's Church is for the instruction, the worship, the edification of children, and that all its ministrations and privileges are for all ages, for all sorts and conditions of men, without any difference or inequality."

This is our legacy. I've embraced the responsibility of carrying this legacy forward and pray that it continues to sustain us in keeping the "edification" of our children in the forefront of our mission.

In my 35 years at St. Andrew's, first as a parishioner, then church school volunteer, and Director of Children and Youth Ministries, I've found our church to be a source of spiritual strength, community, acceptance, and hope. I know these tenets will sustain and ensure a future for all children, youth, and parishioners to know deep in their hearts that St. Andrew's will always be their home.

*We are just a small part of your child's faith journey and grateful to share this time with them. You are welcomed and encouraged to visit the classrooms at any time. Our teacher volunteers appreciate your support. They carefully prepare each week to provide a meaningful lesson that builds from week to week, providing consistency and continuity. Here are a few other ways you can help your child or teen get the most out of their Church School experience:*

**Family Eucharist:** 9:15 am every Sunday in the Chapel welcomes and encourages our youngest children to be their delightful "little persons" under the attentiveness of their families and the warmth and care of the clergy.

**Encourage Regular Attendance:** Church School starts each week at 9:45 am. Please help your child be on time and attend as often as possible. Your child's arrival on time helps the entire class gain the most out of their learning experience.

**Visit the Classroom:** The door is always open to parents, families, and parishioners to visit the classrooms. See how the curriculum works, get to know the teachers, and share a learning experience with the children. We love having Grandparents join us too!

**Pray:** Prayer is a powerful force, and we offer prayers for you and your child each week during class. Your prayers and support are much appreciated for the teachers and the class as well.

**Embrace God's gifts as loving Stewards:** Help children to learn that God has entrusted us to take care of the blessings and gifts we have received. Share your special talents with the class, share a weekly offering, and reach out to our foster brother Kalid and our special senior parishioners with caring letters, artwork, and prayer.

## Helping Hands

### *Classroom Parent Sign Up – Your Commitment is Needed!*

Parents are asked to sign up monthly to volunteer as “helping hands” in the classroom. These extra helping hands not only assist the teachers in the classroom but provide an opportunity for parents to share special time with their child exploring Bible stories together, making a craft or singing a song. It is also a chance to learn more about the curriculum and learning goals. With just a little bit of support from parents at Sunday Church School, we create an environment that more fully “nurtures the gift of faith.” Our children learn to move from their natural faith to a deeper and more personal faith, trusting in God’s love and care. Please take the time to see your child’s classroom teacher to select a few dates during the upcoming year. Thank you for your support and for making a commitment.

## Church School Logistics

**Online Registration:** To prepare for the upcoming year, we are asking families planning to attend the Family Service and/or Church School to register online by September 1. For more information or if you have not yet received the registration link, please email Carol Ferguson at [caferguson@standrewsaa.org](mailto:caferguson@standrewsaa.org). This will help us to gauge class size and align resources to best meet the needs of our Church School families as well as prepare the appropriate safety measures.

**Classroom Placement:** Children’s classroom placement will be emailed to families before the start of the new Church School year on September 11. A Nursery is available during the 10:00 am service for our littlest ones, infants, and

toddlers through age 2. Parents may pick up their child for communion or at any time throughout the duration of the service in Room 204 on the 2nd floor of Parish Hall.

**Joining the Service:** Teachers escort children from the classrooms to be with their families for communion, entering the sanctuary at the Children’s Entrance Hymn at approximately 10:45 am. **Preschool Families:** Please pick up your child in the Morning Glories Preschool class in time for the Children’s Entrance Hymn. Our younger ones are not escorted into the sanctuary and **need to be picked up by a parent**, not a sibling.

### **Safety Standards and Protocols:**

All classrooms are regularly cleaned and sanitized including toys, books, and all materials. Diocesan safety protocols are in place. Hand sanitizer and masks are available and used in all Church School, youth, and library classrooms. More information on Health and Safety standards available on request

**Outreach:** We continue to support our foster brother, Kalid Nazif Abajehad from Ethiopia. Kalid is now 16 years old and lives with his mother, father, sister and two brothers. Each school year we provide a special offering during Advent and Lent and host fundraising events to raise the pledged fund of \$400; which we then send to our sponsored child through Plan USA. Thank you for your continued support for Kalid by helping meet our annual commitment. Send donations to the church being sure to write “Kalid” in the memo line. The Church School also initiates other community outreach service projects throughout the school year.

## Another Successful Week of Marketplace Vacation Bible School !

Our annual VBS in partnership with First Presbyterian, First Baptist Church, and Blue Ocean Faith was held entirely outside all three days with beautiful cooperative weather. Crafts, stories, and music/movement welcomed campers to the Sea of Galilee in 27-28 AD when Jesus “Called Us to be Disciples” and “Fishers of People.”

An updated format created opportunities for greater interactive experiences for campers that embodied dramatic participation with Storytellers Sarah Inwood and Lucy Richert. Children immersed themselves in the Bible narratives: Jesus calling the Disciples, a visit with Martha and Mary, and the Wedding at Cana. Children enjoyed hands-on crafts in the Marketplace with Shopkeepers Stephanie Barker, Jessica Gronemeyer, Addie McCreadie, and Elle McCreadie. They encouraged creativity with fun crafts: making clay pottery, rope strands, koi windsocks, tropical fish pastels, weaving, paper making and so much more! Music and movement channeled children’s natural enthusiasm for the games, songs and challenges that completed this year’s wonderful VBS learning experience that helped us to be disciples of Jesus too!

## Tales from the Journey

This fall we begin a new two-year cycle in the Journey to Adulthood youth program, with an emerging group of young teens in Rite 13, an eager J2A class preparing for their Pilgrimage in June 2023, and young adults in the Capstone class adopting adult ministries and formulating plans for high school graduation in the spring.

The youth program adopted in 2000 continues to evolve through the creative leadership and talents of the teachers, the commitment of parents and the guidance of the clergy and staff. With each year innovative ideas, activities, and resourceful leadership within the teaching teams enhance and complement the program's basic tenets of Scripture, Tradition & Reason, and instilling a formational path; helping our youth to grow in faith, wisdom, and knowledge.

**Capstone & J2A Combine:** This year the Capstone class combines with the J2A class meeting each Sunday. The young adults will provide assistance and leadership working with the younger teens. They are uniquely poised to share firsthand experiences that connect with the challenges younger teens encounter. They can also participate in the 2023 Pilgrimage as their originally planned Pilgrimage in 2020 was cancelled due to the pandemic and subsequent diocesan safety protocols, that limited the scope of youth group travel.

**Outreach:** Our youth and young adults in the Rite 13, J2A and Capstone classes participate in service projects and outreach initiatives. Your support, donations, and sponsorship help them be significant, viable contributors to God's work in the community.

J2A/Capstone youth will walk for the second year in the Out of the Darkness on September 25. This event supports life-saving research, education, advocacy, and support for those impacted by suicide. Sponsored by the local American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP). The walk begins at Hudson Mills Metropark at 1:00 pm.

Rite 13 walks in the 48th annual Ann Arbor CROP Walk on Sunday, October 9 departing at 2 pm from Zion Lutheran Church. Funds help the hungry both locally and globally including the Breakfast at St. Andrew's. Many small gifts make a substantial difference to prevent food insecurity and save lives!
