Psalm 139

- 1 LORD, you have searched me out and known me; *
you know my sitting down and my rising up;
you discern my thoughts from afar.
- 2 You trace my journeys and my resting places *
and are acquainted with all my ways.

- 3 Indeed, there is not a word on my lips, *
but you, O LORD, know it altogether.
- 4 You press upon me behind and before *
and lay your hand upon me.
- 5 Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; *
it is so high that I cannot attain to it.
- 6 Where can I go then from your Spirit? *
where can I flee from your presence?
- 7 If I climb up to heaven, you are there; *
if I make the grave my bed, you are there also.
- 8 If I take the wings of the morning *
and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea,

The Psalm ends with *Gloria Patri*:

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit:
as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. *Amen*.

First Lesson: Romans 5: 1-11

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us. Much more surely then, now that we have been justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. But more than that, we even boast in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

A Collect for the Presence of Christ

Lord Jesus, stay with us, for evening is at hand and the day is past; be our companion in the way, kindle our hearts, and awaken hope, that we may know you as you are revealed in Scripture and the breaking of bread. Grant this for the sake of your love. *Amen.*

Second Collect for Mission

O God and Father of all, whom the whole heavens adore: Let the whole earth also worship you, all nations obey you, all tongues confess and bless you, and men and women everywhere love you and serve you in peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

Concluding Collect

O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of your people; in the multitude of your mercies, look with compassion upon us and all who turn to you for help, for you are gracious, O lover of souls, and to you we give glory, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, now and for ever. *Amen.*

ANSELM

THEOLOGIAN AND ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY, 1109

Anselm is the most important Christian theologian in the West between Augustine and Thomas Aquinas. He was born in Italy about 1033; in 1060 he entered the monastery of Bec in Normandy to study under Stephen Lanfranc, whom he succeeded, first as prior of Bec, and later as Archbishop of Canterbury. Anselm served in Canterbury during the reigns of several kings, with whom he argued about the rights of the Church. Although a Norman, he refused to disparage the Anglo-Saxon saints who had lived in England before him. He managed to live his last few years in peace before his death on 21 April 1109.

In 1087, while still at Bec, he produced his *Proslogium*, an outline of his “ontological argument” for the existence of God. Taking as his text the opening of Psalm 14 (“The fool hath said in his heart: There is no God.”), Anselm undertakes to show that the fool is contradicting himself -- that the concept of God is unique in that anyone who understands what is meant by the question, “Does God exist?” will see that the answer must be “Yes.” Since God is “that than which nothing higher can be thought,” and since the greatest thing that can be thought must have existence (or else we could think of some other thing that was greater that did in fact exist), then God must exist. This argument, called the “ontological proof” for the existence of God, has had both refuters and defenders since it first appeared.

His other great work, *Cur Deus Homo?* (“Why did God become human?”) is more devotional: it shows that God became human out his love for us, in order to provide the salvation we could not provide for ourselves. The best exposition of this thought is in “The Perfect Penitent” section of C. S. Lewis’s *Mere Christianity*.

Anselm is best remembered in the phrase he used to sum up his efforts: “faith seeking understanding.”
