Psalm 92: 1-4, 11-14 Bonum est confiteri

- 1 It is a good thing to give thanks to the LORD, * and to sing praises to your Name, O Most High;
- 2 To tell of your loving kindness early in the morning * and of your faithfulness in the night season;
- 3 On the psaltery, and on the lyre, * and to the melody of the harp.

First Lesson: Jeremiah 3:15-19

A Collect for Peace

Most holy God, the source of all good desires, all right judgments, and all just works: Give to us, your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, so that our minds may be fixed on the doing of your will, and that we, being delivered from the fear of all enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through the mercies of Christ Jesus our Savior. *Amen*.

First Collect for Mission

O God and Father of all, whom the whole heavens adore: Let the whole earth also worship you, all nations obey you, all tongues confess and bless you, and men and women everywhere love you and serve you in peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

General Intercession

Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work, or watch, or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, pity the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake. *Amen*.

WILLIAM WHITE, BISHOP, 1836

William White was born in Philadelphia in 1747 and educated there. In 1770 he went to England, where he was ordained a deacon in December of that year, and a priest in April, 1772. He returned to Philadelphia, where he served at the church of Christ and St. Peter, first as assistant and then as rector, from then until his death 64 years later. He also served as the chaplain of the Continental Congress, 1777-1789, and of the US Senate until 1800. He was unanimously elected the first bishop of Pennsylvania in 1786, so he traveled to England again to be consecrated, along with Samuel Provoost, the Bishop-elect of New York. They were both consecrated to their sees in Lambeth Chapel by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York and the Bishops of Bath and Wells and of Peterborough. The consecration of Samuel Seabury in 1784 in Scotland had spurred the English Parliament to find a way to consecrate bishops without requiring the royal oath.

Bishop White was the chief architect of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church and the wise overseer of its life during the first generation of its history. He was the Presiding Bishop at the first General Convention in 1789 and again from 1795 to his death. He was an able theologian, and played a strong role in the raising of a new generation of leaders: John Henry Hobart, Jackson Kemper, and William Augustus Muhlenberg all called him a mentor. White was the bishop who recognized the pastoral work of the church's first Black priest, Absalom Jones, and ordained him in 1804. Bishop White's gifts of statesmanship and reconciling moderation were guiding forces in the first decades of the Church's life, and set its tone for many. To few men has the epithet "venerable" been more aptly applied.
