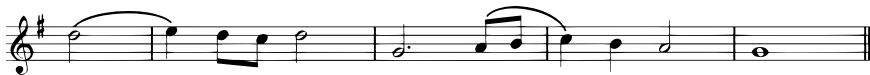

First Lesson: Revelation 7:9-17

After this I, John, looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, “Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!” And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing,

“Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom
and thanksgiving and honor
and power and might
be to our God forever and ever! Amen.”

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, “Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?” I said to him, “Sir, you are the one that knows.” Then he said to me, “These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

Sermon

In the Name of God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

We are at the space in between. Somewhere between the beginning and the end. The known and the unknown. The ancient and the undiscovered. Today is All Saints’ Day... a day that is rich with meaning, and tradition. It’s been a principal feast, in the way we currently imagine it, since at least the 12th Century. In fact,

this date, November 1st, was important long before that. In the ancient Celtic world, this date represents the new year. It's the sunset of one time which leads to the dark of winter, and the beginning of a new cycle of life. The last chance to bring in the harvest. It makes sense that, as the days get colder, and it gets dark earlier... and stays dark longer, that our thoughts may turn inward. Traditionally, this is the day we remember and rejoice in the passing of those who have gone before, and we pause to remember all the saints; past present, and future.

The saints after all, are people just like us. Gifted as we are, with talents, inspiration, or perhaps just the determination to boldly chart a new course, and... with God's help, change the world.

Of all the major feast days on our calendar, this might also be the most mysterious. Coming as it does right after Halloween, there are those who might cynically say that All Saints Day exists as a way to "Christianize" a preexisting holiday, but I don't think it's that simple.

The mystery of All Saints Day stems from the nature of the saints themselves. It's important to remember that when we pray, we don't necessarily pray *to* the saints... because power doesn't come from them. We pray *with* the Saints. They essentially occupy their own in between space, bridging the gulf of space and time to be with us, among us, as near as the next moment. At a time of year when legend says that spirits roam the Earth, looking to cause a little mischief... at least for one night a year, then acknowledging the presence of the saints as powerful examples of dedication and perseverance doesn't seem so fantastic. But in order to do that, we might have to get comfortable with the mystery of uncertainty.

As the old hymn says, the saints can, have, and will come from anywhere; a doctor, a soldier, a queen. They're out there... somewhere, and you might have met quite a few already. How many are there? We don't know. When will you meet them? No way to be sure. Could you be one? Time will tell.

Somewhere between our flawed, but beautiful human existence, and the divine ideal of God, the saints of the past, the ones with us now, and those yet to come, remind us that amazing things have happened, can happen, and will happen every day... because the Holy Spirit is at work in our hearts every day. If we are willing to embrace the unknown, and make room in ourselves for a little mystery, then faith makes miracles possible. That's incredibly hopeful, despite any sadness, uncertainty, or weariness we might rightly feel right now. Hope for a new creation... one that celebrates the possibility in the infinite time between moments, is what this "In between space" is all about.

So, you might rightly ask yourself... if today is all about hope, then why are we reading about the end of the world?

If I could change one thing about the popular understanding of Revelation... well, first, I'd make sure that everyone knew there was no "s" in Revelation(s).

But the other thing I would do is undo the notion that the story is all about fire, - misery, war, famine, disease, and death! That's not the end of the story!

Revelation is all about subverting expectations, but to fully appreciate that, I'd like to suggest that we take a closer look at the text. The portion that was read today gives us an important clue. It begins with the words; "After this, I looked..."

That's after what exactly? One of the most important things I've learned about deciphering a text, no matter what it is, is, whenever possible, to look at what happens immediately before, and after what you've been given to read. In this case, right before the lesson we heard today, comes the well-known lines about 144,000. Of course, that's not a random number. That's 12,000 from each of the 12 tribes of Israel. Seems straightforward enough; John hears an angel tell him how many will be included in this great victory. Case closed... but not if you look more closely, and dive into the mystery.

Right after hearing about this 144,000, the text tells us that John turns and SEES something different: "a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages..."

In short, what he is told to expect is different than what actually happens. Something is afoot here! Rather than put a number, or a price tag on salvation that might leave someone out... because you'd hate to be number 12,001, or from the 13th tribe... this is a new kingdom, not with a lion at the head of the army, but a lamb. And now, with untold numbers, the seals are broken, and a new vision of the future awaits.

But in the meantime, here we are... in between.

Why?

It's the space in between where we encounter Jesus, so that we can make that future a reality! Between the old and the new, the known and the unknown, the familiar and the challenging... Jesus is our guide in those times, in those in between spaces, when we don't know where to go, or what to do, or even if we should do anything at all. Jesus is there.

Hope is there too. In between is where the Holy Spirit goes to work, if we let her... to change our hearts. Sometimes it's a nudge; the undeniable urge to take one little step. Or, it might seem more forceful. You might even throw up your hands and say: "Really God? This is what you're asking me to face today?"

So, in this moment, and in THIS moment... this space in between, on this day when we remember John and Andrew, and Luke and all the saints who have gone boldly forward and before us: don't forget to stop, take a breath, listen and look around. Because in the middle, in that place of vital energy, where potential and action intersect... at that mysterious space in between, there's God, waiting for us, and for what comes next. Amen.
